

Big Crowd Sees Parkdale Defeat Youth Club 6-5

The Parkdale Flyers rapped in quick goals in the second period to break a 2-2 tie and hung on in the face of a desperate third period offensive by the B.Y.C. to take a 6-5 victory over the youth club in the first game of the Island League semi-finals played before a crowd of almost 1,200 at the Sports Arena last night.

The B.Y.C. jumped into a 2-0 lead by 12:46 of the first period but saw it dissolve as Kip Ready notched one for Parkdale before the period ended and the Flyers scored 4 more in less than six minutes in the second period to go into the third with a 5-2 lead. Parkdale hit again in the early minutes of the third for a 6-2 lead but with less than 8 minutes to go in the game big Spy Ready took charge and fired 2 goals and set up Wally Shepherd for the fifth goal.

But the last-ditch B.Y.C. attack fell short by one goal. Digging Dempse Gregory shot two goals for Parkdale and Kip Ready, Skip Carver and Allie Carver chipped in with singles.

Besides Spy Ready's pair, Lloyd Shepherd, Frank Shepherd and

Wally Shepherd each counted one.

STOUT DEFENSE

Parkdale threw up a pretty stout defense around goaltender Frank Roper who had only 3 saves to make in the hectic second and only 4 in the third. But even at that he had to make some sharp saves. In the other end of the rink John Gehrke was peppered with 27 drives and the Parkdale players had a free rein around the cage and once in the second period had two players with the puck inside the blue line with not a youth club player in sight. Gehrke handled 27 drives in the game.

Referees Moe Goodwin and Brian MacCallum had a busy time handing out 13 penalties in the first two periods including 2 misconducts to the B.Y.C. but in the third things quieted down and Jack Ready of B.Y.C. and Skip Carver were the only offenders getting the gate when they were tagging a high sticking duel in the corner. Of the 15 penalties passed around 11 were B.Y.C. sentences.

Lloyd Shepherd swatted in Merrill Pineau's rebound at 2:29 of the

first period to get the scoring underway and at 12:46 Frank Shepherd jumped out of the penalty box to grab Brian Lewis' clearing shot at the center line and coast right in on Roper in the clear before picking the corner of the net with his shot.

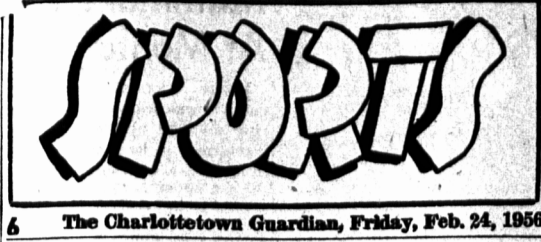
At 14:18 from a faceoff deep in the B.Y.C. zone Willie Dunn got the puck to leftwinger Kip Ready and Ready made the red light blink to make it a 2-1 hockey game at the end of the first.

SHEPHERD INJURED

Near the 15 minute mark speedy Frank Shepherd got tangled with Jim MacLeod of Parkdale when he attempted to check the Flyers rightwinger near the boards and ended up with a gashed leg. Frank was carried from the ice and taken to the hospital for repairs but returned to the game in the third period to give some spark to the youth club attack.

The deluge started at 9:20 of the second period when Junior MacLeod whipped a shot from just inside the blue line that Gehrke stopped but couldn't hold. As the puck fell to the ice Skip Carver was standing there to bat it into the net and tie the score. At 15:35 Pete Hill carried the puck down the sideboards. Gehrke stopped his drive but Dempse Gregory was planked on his doorstep to swat in the rebound. Less than a minute later it was Gregory back again as the youth club got a little sloppy and allowed Gregory to pick up a loose puck near the blue line and sail right in on Gehrke unobscured and give Parkdale a 4-2 lead.

At 17:05 it was 5-2 for Parkdale when Willie Dunn, who played great hockey for Parkdale through out, hit the twines from the side after Gehrke had been kicking away rubber from all angles.



Sask. And N. Ontario To Play Sudden-Death Game

FORT WILLIAM, Ont. (CP)—The Dominion high-school curling championships flattened out into a straight east-west final Thursday night and Northern Ontario and Saskatchewan braced for a sudden-death game to decide the title.

The one-shot encounter for the national championship was scheduled to begin shortly after the conclusion of the ninth round in which the finalists won their matches handsly.

Frankenstein - Fontinato Have Something In Common

Another long standing sports record went by the boards Wednesday when Lou Fontinato picked up 7 minutes in penalties as the Toronto Maple Leafs were beating Rangers 4-2 to pass by 2 minutes Red Horner's 20-year-old mark of 167 minutes set with the Leafs back in 1935-36 (Leavin', Rock 'n Roll) Fontinato is just in his rookie year in the big time and is apparently determined to make his mark one way or the other. What he lacks in ability he makes up for in a vampire-like thirst for blood and encouraged by a howling mob of revitalized Ranger fans, coach Phil Watson and undoubtedly the New York front office Fontinato is making sure that there is enough spilled blood to go around and satisfy all thirsts.

Fontinato is coach Watson's fair-haired boy. In Phil's eyes Lou can do no wrong and after the game in which the Leaper broke Horner's record Watson gave him a warm smile and a pat on the back. Perhaps if he had patted a little harder a little further south he would have been doing Fontinato more good. This 24-year-old defenseman received the undying love of all New York fans and most of the sports writers when he took a 2-round decision from Maurice Richard in a bout that was the feature of a game at Madison Square Gardens recently and has come to typify the "New Ranger Spirit" which has been packing them in at the box office.

Prowling about the ice with the illing strains of "kill 'em, Lou, sock 'em Lou, Lemme see some blood Lou," Fontinato has tangled with all the big ones and little ones that dare to come his way and although he admits it's nothing to be proud of, "playing rough got me on top." The only question left is "on top of what?" It certainly isn't the top of the heap of this year's crop of N. H. L. rookies. When we hear the Calder Trophy being passed around we often hear names like Glen Hall, Dick Duff, Henri Richard, Hank Cicca or Andy Heberton being shuffled back and forth but only the most biased of New York writers ever put the finer on one Fontinato.

There is something sickening about all of this. Something frightening too, not unlike the uneasy feeling produced by walking alone through a graveyard at midnight. It is as if we on this 20th century sports scene had ringside seats as Dr. Frankenstein creates a new monster. A monster that when created could turn on its creator and destroy him. About the only difference in the two "doctors" is that this present one isn't working in the interests of science but only for the sake of a few box office dollars. Dr. Frankenstein might have been excused on the grounds of a sick mind but there is no explanation on earth can excuse the Manhattan Fans, writers and management who glorify in Fontinato's rough-house antics and who not only do nothing to discourage them but go out of their way to encourage them.

Wh a hockey is played right it is the most exciting game in the world when it is played like a water front brawl it is nauseating. It is players like Fontinato who give the hockey the bad name it has got. No cartoonist in his cartoons ever typifies hockey as being any.

Habs Run Streak To Eleven With 5-2 Win Over Rangers

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens ran their current win streak to 11 with a convincing 5-2 victory Thursday night over New York Rangers, the fourth setback in a row for the New Yorkers.

The five Montreal goals came from as many players, Jean Beliveau racking up his 42nd of the season and Maurice Rocket Richard his 34th. Each also had one assist. Jackie Leclair, Henri Pocket Rocket Richard and Bernard Geoffrion counted the other Montreal goals and Bill Gadsby and Dean Prentice scored for the Rangers.

The Montreal win left Canadiens with a 20-point margin over Detroit Red Wings at the top of the National Hockey League standings.

Rangers' loss again thwarted their efforts to regain second place and they still trail the Red Wings by a single point. The Detroiters have a game in hand.

The crowd of 13,802 saw the unusual spectacle of a team falling to get a shot on goal during one full period. The Rangers were the victims in the first period when not a single New York shot was direct on goalie Jacques Plante and the official sheet showed a fat zero for the New Yorkers.

Canadiens pelted goalie Lorne Worsley with 18 in the opening period and for the full game over shot Rangers 40-22.

In their last 11 games, Canadians now have posted eight wins and three ties. They were last defeated on January 26 in Boston and when they meet Detroit Red Wings here Saturday night, they can virtually clinch the NHL title. If the Montrealers win they will have 86 points. Detroit would need to win all its remaining games to reach 86.
