Tourists Attracted By N. F. B. Pictures

The showings of films supplied by the National Film Board this summer have been seen by a total of approximately 10,000 tourists in this Province. Almost 140,000 have been seen throughout the three month season, in the showings of films depicting various sections of Canada, and the life and culture of its people.

The program for the year has included showings at Stanhope Beach Inn, Dalway House, Seaside Inn, Shaws Hotel, Kegonach Beach, and the Cavendish area. It has been the policy to have one showing a week throughout July and August at each of these eight centres, and the attendance has been excellent in almost all cases. Over 4,400 visitors were on hand for the total of 60 showings.

Films have also been shown on the M. V. Abegweit during its 130 crossings from Tormentine. These were conducted by Miss Jane Johnston, Charlottetown, and Miss Isabel Howatt, Summerside. 77 shows were given on the Abegweit, and were seen by approximately 5,800 visitors.

Outstanding Display Of Dahlias At Farm

Showing flowers every color of the rainbow and then some, the ninety-five yard long Dahlia display at the Experimental Station has been built up into one of the prettiest and best Dahlia flower patches in the Province under the guidance of Horticulturist Mr. Gordon Warren.

With about 115 different varieties in the patch and the flowers varying in size from two to four inches in diameter, the dahlias present an arresting spectacle. Some are nearly six feet in height while the younger varieties are scarcely a foot and a half high.

While there has been quite a collection of Dahlias at the Station for the past number of years, it has not been until recently that an effort was made to build up the patch. This year about 60 new varieties have been added and red and yellow varieties were imported.

The Dahlias are planted in rows with each one being planted two and a half feet apart. Mr. Warren tries to grow a plant to one stem. "In that way you get fewer blooms," he stated, "but larger sizes and better quality."

Included in the patch are the formal and informal Decoratives and semi-double Cactus and show or ball type Dahlias and Pom-Poms. The miniature type resemble the larger flowers but do not exceed four inches in diameter.

Standing out among the flowers are the sulphur-yellow colored Avengers, the Windemere with their yellow suffused orange color, the straight Cactus and show or ball type Dahlias and Pom-Poms. The miniature type resemble the larger flowers but do not exceed four inches in diameter.

Mr. Warren discards the Dahlias each year on a quality basis. Every year a few are lost through disease and a number fail to survive during the winter.

"I look for health and vigor in the plant and strong stems," he stated. "They must have good flowering habits as well as distinctive and interesting colors and types."

Many of the bulbs are brought from Australia but a number come from Holland and some are imported from other parts of Canada. After receiving the bulbs in the early spring they are stored in a moderately cool dry cellar in sand and in May are put in a forcing frame, also in sand.

Here the tubers sprout and are taken from the sand and divided. The divisions are made so that one eye and part of the original tuber are always in the parts planted.

Teacher Returns From Pilgrimage

Miss Margaret Butler, teacher at Queen Square School, Charlottetown, returned early this week from a Holy Year pilgrimage to Rome, sponsored by the Canadian Federation of Newman Clubs.

36 representatives from various sections of Canada were in the pilgrimage which sailed from Quebec on July 18th. En route to Rome, Miss Butler spent several days in Paris, and also visited the Shrine of the Little Flower at Lourdes. Two days were spent in Lourdes visiting the Miraculous Grotto, the Gothic Basilica and the new Church of the Rosary which contains fifteen chapels.

After some time spent in Nice, the pilgrimage proceeded to Italy. While in Rome, Miss Butler was one of the members of the Newman pilgrimage who were privileged to have a private audience with His Holiness Pope Pius XII at his summer residence, Castel Gandolfo. The group also attended the public audience in St. Peter's Basilica.

After leaving Rome Miss Butler visited Assisi and other points of interest before proceeding to Florence, the art capital of Italy. The tour continued to Bologna and Padua where the Basilica containing St. Anthony's remains is located. After a few days in the historic city of Venice, she went on to Verona, Milan and Stresa.

From Italy the party went by way of Simplon Pass into Switzerland, and after touring that country returned to France. They then crossed the channel to England and proceeded to London. While in London, Miss Butler saw many places of historic interest including St. Paul's Cathedral, Tower of London, Westminster Abbey, the Houses of Parliament, Buckingham Palace and Trafalgar Square.

A day was spent visiting Oxford University, Warwick Castle, and Stratford-on-Avon, the birthplace of Shakespeare. The group also visited Windsor Castle, Eton College and Hampton Court Palace.

The tour was continued to Dublin and Cork where the party visited Blarney Castle before proceeding to Cobh where the ship was boarded for the return trip to New York.

The entire tour on the Continent was made by chartered bus and Miss Butler said she enjoyed the experience quite a thrill travelling through the Alps into Switzerland.

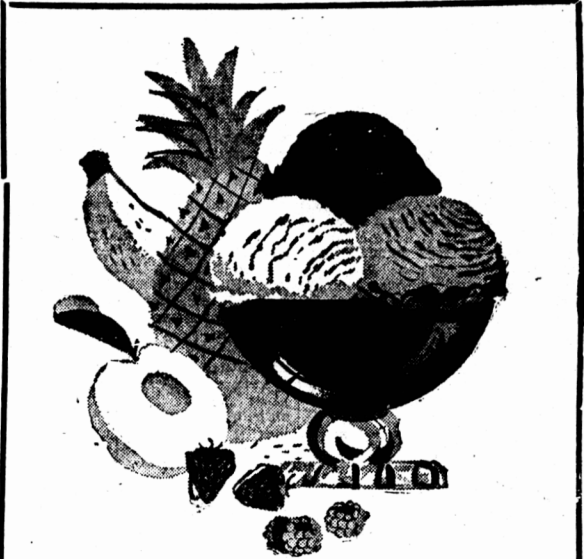
