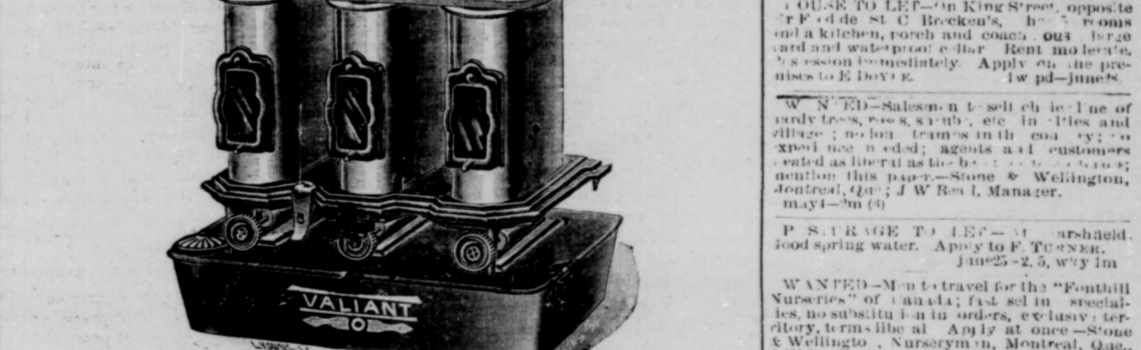

THE MOUNTAIN RAIL.—At the police court during the month of June there were 26 convictions for drunkenness, 6 for breach of the Canada Temperance Act, and 3 dismissals: 1 conviction for larceny; 1 for using profane language on the streets; 3 for assault; 2 for failure to obey regulations; and 2 for neglecting to pay truck license. INSURANCE MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Central Fire Insurance Company was held in this city yesterday. The Chairman said the manager, Mr. D. Morrison, of Carleton, submitted the yearly report, which showed that 66 policies had been issued during the year past. A summary of the general report submitted showed that 452 policies had been issued by the company for the last three years; carrying insurance to the amount of \$380,000, and that the capital is \$8,450. The average cost of insuring \$1,000 for 3 years was \$1.37, or less than 46c. per annum. The old Board of Directors were re-elected as follows: Roderick Mann, President; Joseph Wynn, Vice-President; Donald Morrison, Managing Director.
