The special from Charlottetown left here about ten o'clock with 15 cars well loaded with Orangemen and friends. Everything passed off very quietly, and everyone appeared to enjoy themselves. The Artillery band furnished some good music. FROM MONTREAL.—The Campana arrived here yesterday about 11 o'clock with freight and a large number of passengers. The Campana is a twin screw steamer, and is very nicely fitted up, being lighted throughout by electricity. She has about 50 large staterooms, and is commanded by Captain Baquet, late of the Miramichi. GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

New York, July 11.—Rose Finn, aged 19, was shot in the head and instantly killed yesterday by Michael McGowen at 23rd street and 10th avenue. The girl was on her way to work when accosted by McGowen, whom she had jilted. The two talked together a few minutes when the man drew a revolver and fired three shots at the girl, each taking effect in her head. McGowen was captured at Avenue A and 17th street. WASHINGTON, July 11.—Advices to the surgeon-general of the marine hospital service indicate quite an alarming increase in yellow fever in Cuba and other West India Isles. The week ending July 29th recorded twenty-eight deaths in Santiago, while there is an average of five deaths daily at Puerto Principe, a city of about 45,000 people. There are about 200 cases in the military hospital, and the disease is rapidly increasing. PITTSBURG, Pa, July 11.—Mrs. Lena Reeser, of Springhill, Allegheny, after hanging Elita, her 3 year old daughter to a bed post, and strangling as she thought successfully, Hilda, her seven months old babe, then committed suicide by hanging herself to the hinge of a closet door. The rag about the baby's neck was not tight enough to produce immediate death and she may live, although it is doubtful. The others were dead. WASHINGTON, July 11.—The state department has received from United States Minister Sill, at Chempalpo, under date of May 16th, some additional details of the fall of Pak Yongho, the Empress's nephew. He was found guilty of conspiracy and pronounced a traitor. The minimum legal penalty for this offense is imprisonment for life, but the Emperor being at liberty exercises clemency and reduced the term of banishment to ten years. The prisoner was taken to a small island on the coast near Chempalpo, where he will pass the period of exile. Five common men implicated in the same conspiracy were hanged the same night. BIRTH.
