Western Hospital In Alberton Makes Appeal

The Board of Trustees of the Western Hospital in Alberton are making a financial appeal to the people of Western Prince in particular and to the province in general. In a letter from the Board of Trustees of the Hospital and signed by Rev. W. E. Monaghan, of Alberton, President, and Mr. Wilfred Tanton, secretary, we quote in part:

"The Western Hospital has been in operation for the past five years. You, the people of West Prince, are justifiably proud of this fine institution with its attractive appearance and, more important, its ever widening field of services to the sick and its usefulness as a health center. The Hospital is approved by the Provincial Government and is a member of the Maritime Hospital Service Association. Over 1100 (eleven hundred) babies were born in the hospital and six thousand patients were treated since the opening.

"The total cost of construction, equipment, etc. was approximately one hundred and forty thousand dollars of which sixty thousand dollars remains unpaid. In order to continue payment on this Construction Debt, the Board of Trustees has decided to appeal to your generosity through an envelope collection."

It is hoped that this worthy appeal will have the success it so richly deserves. This is the only hospital west of Summerside and serves an immense territory and a large population. Any contribution we make to this worthy appeal will not only provide for ourselves and our families by giving us a hospital at our doors, but we will be rewarded by a merciful Saviour who regards what we do for the sick and suffering as done unto Him.
