*REPAIRING SCHOOL - The ratayers of the Montague High School are doing extensive repair work on the school this summer. This school is one of the oldest country schools now in use. The building has been hauled to the opposite side of the road some hundred yards from its former position. It is now on a gradual slope of a hill facing south. The building is to have a new hardwood floor, new individual seats, and some change in the lighting system. The work is under the direction of Mr. A. O. Connor.

New Room Added To Montague High

The work of constructing the new room in the Montague High School has almost been completed, except for the two new windows on the north side. The room, has been studded and covered with ten-test to provide warm, comfortable quarters, with ample space for a large class, sufficient lighting is provided by eight ceiling lights and the window space. The basement is now divided into three rooms, each opening to a corridor leading to the first floor. The corridor has also been finished with ten-test, so that the basement now provides a fine appearance. The addition of this new room brings the total to nine classrooms, which will give some indication of the growth of the school during the past few years. It is expected that the enrollment this year will exceed the 250 enrollment of last year, but it is hoped that the new room will relieve the congestion in some small degree. Also at the present time Mr. Harry Munro, Contractor, is completing the work of new roofing the west end of the school, a work which has been necessary for some years. Mr. Peter Clary, janitor, is also at work cleaning the school in his usual thorough manner, and he assures that all will be in readiness when school opens.
