WINNIPEG (CP) — Calgary Stampedeers are protesting their 16-15 loss to Winnipeg Blue Bombers here Monday night in a Western Interprovincial Football Union game as a result of the final minute of play—one that is shaping up as the weirdest minute in the history of the league.

Bob Masterson, general manager of the Stamps, said Wednesday he is mailing a protest to WIFU Commissioner G. Sydney Haller of Winnipeg based on movies of the game that "definitely showed the Blue Bombers had 13 men actively engaged in protecting the kicker on the play which won the game for them."

Coach Al Sherman of the Bombers admitted Tuesday night Bombers had an extra man on the field when end Tom Miner booted a 37-yard field goal which wiped out

## Lumsden Says Disposal Of Money For Swim Was Unfair

TORONTO (CP) — A marathon swimmer, Cliff Lumsden, 26, said Wednesday that the disposal of prize money for Monday's Lake Ontario marathon swim was unfair because it turned the race into a simple endurance test.

A man could have gone only a mile offshore, stayed in the warm water and collected for sticking it out the longest," said Lumsden, who was pulled out after covering 10 miles of the 32-mile swim in almost six hours.

Tom Park, 31, of Marineland, Calif., received 13,000 for being out last after 10 hours and 21 miles; Muriel Ferguson, 20, of Toronto, second-last, got \$2,000 and Robert Cossette, 26, of Port Alfred, Que., got 1,500 for being third-last to quit.

Each of seven others who started the race with \$500; \$10,000 went to the Canadian Olympic Fund and \$7,000 to help amateur swimming.

Lumsden said the prizes should have been given for distance covered and not for length of time in the water.

The marathon swim committee, however, said it used the fairest method possible in awarding prizes. In the fog shrouding the lake, it said, it was impossible to pinpoint all swimmers and estimate accurate distances covered.

## WAIVED PENALTY
