CAPTURE OF BERNARD!

LONDON, July 16. The Times says:—"Earl Beaconsfield will be welcomed in London to-day as the chief actor in one of the most honorable triumphs in the modern diplomacy of England. To the fame of a distinguished English statesman he has added that of a singularly successful foreign minister, and it will be hard to say what greater distinction can remain for him.

LONDON, July 16, 5.30 p.m. Earl Beaconsfield alighted at the station at 4.50, and after a brief hand-shaking Earl Beaconsfield and Lord and Lady Salisbury entered the carriage.

As they drove along, the West Strand was one continuous cheer, with pouring bouquets by hundreds from the crowd and the houses. The crowd followed the carriage cheering and throwing flowers all the way to Downing Street.

Later, after reaching his residence, Lord Beaconsfield in response to repeated calls from the crowd, appeared at a window and thanked them for his reception. He said Lord Salisbury and himself had brought back peace; but peace he hoped with honor such as would satisfy the Sovereign and country.

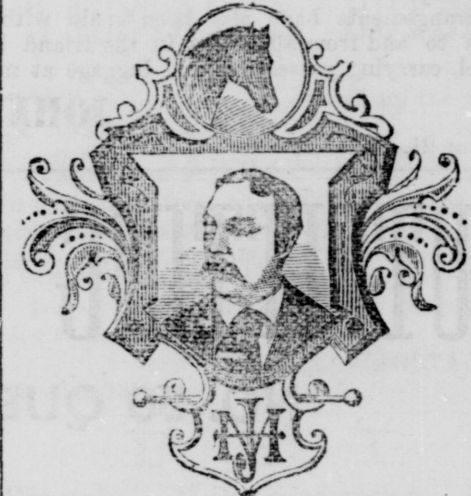

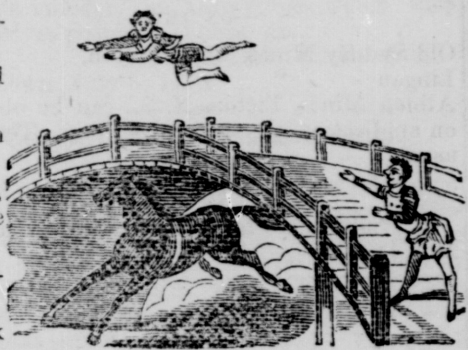
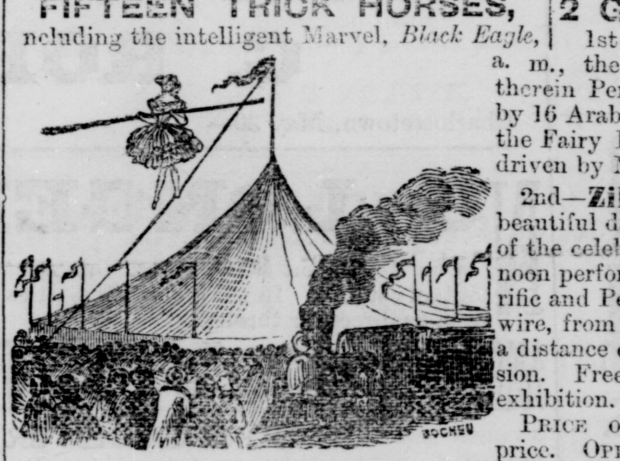
