Boys Lost.—A St. John's, Nfld., dispatch, says a very sad accident occurred at Fox Harbor a few days ago. At 1 o'clock in the afternoon Bernard and Michael Sampson, aged 12 and 8 years, the two oldest sons of John and Ellen Sampson, set out to overhaul snares which they had set some days previously. After an absence of some hours the anxious parents began to grow uneasy about their loved ones. When night came the boys failed to make their appearance, and soon the alarm was sent over the neighborhood that they had lost their way. Every man and boy in the vicinity, with guns and every necessary preparation for the restoration of the boys, set out in pursuit. Volley after volley of firing was kept up until 1 o'clock in the morning, when everyone, wet and weary, returned home to snatch a few hours' repose before resuming the search on the following day. Next morning the search was again resumed, but evening came with the same result. It is yet hoped when the snow has gone off the ground that the bodies of the unfortunate children may be found.—Halifax Herald.

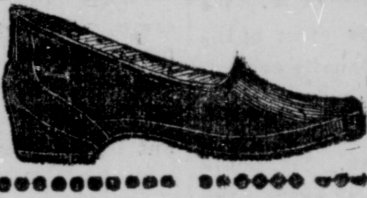

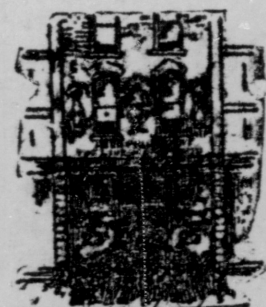
