Steam Communication.

The P. E. Island Steam Navigation Company have made a spirited reply to the charges contained in the resolutions passed by the Summerside meeting.

When it became known that a Canadian Pacific train would leave Pointe au Lac at 12.35, efforts were immediately made by Mr. Unsworth and the Company to have the local train from Pointe au Lac leave as late as possible so as to connect with this 12.35 train.

Concerning a new and fast screw steamer they say:—

The Company have had in contemplation for some time the obtaining of a fast iron steamer, so as to reduce the time occupied in crossing, but the difficulties have been greater than the public are aware of.

The steamers now on the route are, the Company contend, sound, strong and tight; and the fact that there has been no loss of life or cargo—no damage on account of the steamers—is pointed out.

There are many pleasure passenger steamers running out of the United Kingdom with less accommodation than the St. Lawrence, which are licensed and do carry from 800 to 1,000 passengers at a time, as many as we do some months.
