

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FOR GOODS A SPECIALTY.—Bee Bros' CABOT CLUB meeting tonight.

FOR DRILL.—No. 1 Battery will meet for drill tonight at 8 o'clock.

THE WOMEN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY of Zion church will hold their annual thank-offering service on Thanksgiving night in the basement. Programme will appear later.

TO-MORROW EVENING.—The missionary meeting to-morrow evening in the First Methodist Church will be one of special interest. All should come and hear the good speeches and excellent music.

ANOTHER NEW CHURCH.—A Presbyterian church is being built at Shediac at a cost of \$3,000. It will be much larger than the one that was burned. There will be a basement, and a tower and steeple.

THE BODY REMOVED.—The body of the late Harold H. Carvell, was removed today from Pease's Cemetery, to the Railway Station enroute to Hampton Station N. B. The body before interment last November was embalmed with a view to this removal by Messrs. Mark Wright, & Co., Mr. Wright being a graduate of the Clark Entomological School of U. S. A.

CRAWFORD NOT GUILTY.—The trial of Crawford for the murder of John Branton, the young Englishman, which has been in progress in St. John for some time past, was concluded on Saturday, when a verdict of "Not Guilty" was rendered. The evidence of the various witnesses seems to make it clear that Crawford was insane at the time he killed his innocent and unoffending victim.

BEREAVEMENT AT SUMMERSIDE.—Early yesterday morning, Messrs. Brace, McKay & Co.'s store was broken into, an entrance being effected through a back window. A quantity of cartridges and knives were taken, also a watch. In the afternoon a young lad named Gilbert Gallant was arrested and some of the missing articles, including the rifle taken from Messrs. F. W. Strong & Co., a few nights ago, were found in his possession.—Guardian.

THE MARKET.—The market to-day was very well attended, and the supply inside was good. But outside, that of hay, oats and potatoes, was not up to the demand. We quote prices as follows: Butter 18 to 20 cts; chickens per pair 35 to 45 cts; ducks 50 to 55 cts; fowls 50 to 55 cts; cabbage per doz 48 to 60 cts. Outside, hay sold at 30 to 34 cts; oats 32 to 33 cts; potatoes 20 cts. Eggs have again advanced, and are now selling at 13 to 15 cts per doz.

BUTTER AND CHEESE.—Australia and New Zealand appear to have completely revolutionized the butter and cheese trade of Great Britain, and it appears that these antipodean colonies have the very cheek of Brother Jonathan himself, as they are trying to lick him on his own territory. Private advices from Boston state that Australian representatives have been in that city and New York, making enquiries with a view to making arrangements for shipping the lowest quality of butter and cheese to the United States, and paying the duty of 4c per lb.—Trade Bulletin.

POLICE COURT.—Matthew Doyle, of South Shore, appeared at the Police Court to-day, charged by Lauchlan McLean, of this city, with obtaining goods by false pretences. The prosecutor is engaged in the lobster fishing business. On March 14th and 15th last, Doyle, it is alleged, obtained from McLean two thousand laths, twenty pounds nails, rope, twine, &c., the whole valued at about \$30, to engage in the lobster fishing, promising to give the complainant a certain number of lobsters in payment for the goods. The payment was not made, and it is stated, the lobsters were sold to other parties. The Magistrate adjourned the case for one week.

STEAMERS' MOVEMENTS.—The St. Lawrence could not make the trip from Pictou yesterday afternoon on account of the storm prevailing. She will be due here at the usual time this evening. The SS. Bonavista sails from Montreal this morning, Oct. 16th, for Charlotte town, Sydney and St. John's, Nfld. She will be due at Charlottetown Monday morning, Oct. 22nd. See advt.

The Polino, of the Dobell line, will be due here this evening. The Tiber, of the same line, will make her first trip to this port on Saturday morning and will sail same day for St. John's and Claude Sound, Newfoundland. The Alameda did not cross yesterday on account of the storm. There was therefore no mail via the Capes to-day.

DAIRYING NOTES.—Mr. Dillon has received from Professor Robertson a letter asking that Messrs. H. S. Parsons, of the Cranford creamery; Joseph Burgess, of the Dunk River creamery; and Albert Kelly, of the Kensington creamery, be transferred to Ontario to take charge of winter creameries there. The factories above mentioned will continue work as usual, the places of the old managers being filled by new men. The New Perth, Cranford and Tryon creameries will be running the winter. Professor Robertson has intimated to Mr. Dillon his intention of paying a visit to the Island about the 1st November, on which occasion he will be accompanied by Mr. Hodgson and Mr. McKernon. Mr. Hodgson, it will be remembered, purchased largely of Island cheese last fall. Mr. McKernon is a member of the firm of A. A. Ayer & Co., Montreal.

THE STOLEN GOODS RECOVERED.—Yesterday afternoon Marshal Cameron despatched Sergt. Bradley and officer Warren with a horse and wagon to the old lunatic asylum, Brighton, to search for the goods stolen from the warehouse of W. W. Clarke on Sunday morning. In about half an hour they returned with nine webs of the stolen coal-lining and flannel. The goods were found in an old barn close to the asylum and were concealed under a quantity of hay. After tea they again visited the place made another search and found two more webs of the cloth hidden in the same barn under some hay a short distance from the others. The cloth is now in Marshal Cameron's office where it was identified as the stolen property by Mr. Clarke. The goods are supposed to have been removed to the barn in a lobster boat which was misused on Sunday from Pease's No 1 wharf and which is the same one seen afloat at Victoria Park on Sunday morning.

COURT OF CHANCERY.

The Court of Appeal in Equity met at 11 a.m., and was adjourned until 20th November, 1894, at 11 o'clock, to hear the Methodist School case.

The Court of Chancery afterwards met, and the Master of the Rolls delivered judgment in the case of Mayhew vs. Stone, tried before him last August. The judgment of the Court was that the defendant was a trustee of the \$1,005 in dispute, and she was directed to pay that amount, which is now on deposit in the Savings Bank, to the plaintiff on demand, each party to pay their own costs of the suit. The grounds upon which the judgment rested were:— 1st. That no contract for wages was proved between the late Zachariah Mayhew and the defendant. 2nd. That the agreement proved by the defendant was not enforceable either at law or equity. 3rd. That the defendant's claim was not corroborated by outside testimony.

A COBBLER'S RICH FIND.

Here is a bit of real life which surpasses fiction. According to the Savannah, Ga., News, one Jones, bookkeeper of the Southern L. & C. of that city, disappeared in 1873, and after a while it was found he had robbed the bank by means of forged drafts on its New York correspondents. He was found in Paris, fled from there, found again and arrested in Belgium, and killed himself after his arrest. He left nothing but some old clothes, among them a pair of shoes which lay in a cupboard for twenty years, when a man found them and took them to be repaired. The cobbler found the upper to be lined with bank notes and securities of considerable value. The police learned of the find and have notified the bank, and now there is a prospect that the bank will get back part of its own.

PROTECTION AGAINST FIRES.

The people of Shediac have come to the very wise conclusion that they should be provided with some kind of protection in case of fire. Four tanks have been dug and walled up. They are twelve feet square and ten feet deep. They will be supplied with water from a reservoir by means of pipes. A hand engine has been purchased and with a requisite quantity of hose the people of Shediac should be in a very good position to fight fire. The money for these improvements has been raised by subscription.

The discovery of what appears to be a valuable iron deposit near St. John's, Newfoundland, may prove to be a profitable thing for the ancient colony. The New Glasgow iron men seem to have a high opinion of the Newfoundland deposit, and so have invested in it. It is a long distance from the peninsula of Avalon to the East River of Pictou, but possibly the freight on ore would not be greater than from Torlock, where the New Glasgow company get a great deal of the ore they use.
