Prominent Maritime Woman Sets A Staggering Pace

HALIFAX, (CP) — Mrs. Abbie Lane had been a housewife and mother for 18 years when she traded the comforts of domestic life for a career in the hard-headed business world.

Now she is one of the most prominent women in the Maritimes and Halifax's first woman deputy mayor. Some people say she should have stuck to her pinkie shears, but they all agree she sets a pace in social and business circles that would stagger most men.

Abigail Amanda Lane is active in civic politics, has helped in provincial and federal Progressive Conservative organization, is Nova Scotia president of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, member of the school board, an ardent social worker, well-known stage personality and does two daily radio shows, besides her regular household duties.

NO PRETENSIONS

But she says she is just an ordinary housewife who decided 12 years ago that the saying "a woman's place is in the home" is just so much hokum.

It all started on a dare. Back in 1942 when war work gave her a taste of the business world, she considered getting a full-time job. Her husband, manager of a savings and loan company, withheld his laughter long enough to tell her she had been away from work so long she'd never be able to take orders. "I dare you," he taunted. "You wouldn't last two weeks."

Just to show her husband, she took the first job that came

LOVED NEWSPAPER WORK
"Then along came an offer from the old Halifax Chronicle to be their society editor, and it was great."

"And I hated it," she admits. "But I wasn't going to give in."

She had never written a line of copy but she could type and before long was wondering why she hadn't started journalism years ago. At that time, the job of woman's editor included covering anything from murders to beauty contests.

Newspaper work only whetted her appetite and when the paper established radio station CJCH in 1944, she joined the staff as woman's commentator. The CBC soon lined her up as the "Mother" in a farm drama series. Her term with the paper ended when the Chronicle merged with the Halifax Herald, Dec. 31, 1948.

Her other interests soon had her to her neck in work, but she continued in radio to become one of the Maritimes' favorite personalities.

Her first crack at politics came three years ago when she contested a civic by-election and launched a whirlwind "kitchen campaign." Her election committee was made up of dozens of housewives who looked up the telephone numbers of every voter in the ward—about 5,000—and kept phones ringing for weeks. Abbie won by more than 500 votes and since then has been re-elected by acclamation.

Mrs. Lane has managed to raise three children—Jean, 14, Ted, 20, and Margaret, 27, married and a mother. Mrs. Lane gives much of the credit for her success to her husband who has always prompted and encouraged her. He's used to being referred to as "Mr. Abbie Lane."

Although she's a popular and well-paid radio performer she

maintains that her husband still earns the family's bread and butter.

"I just supply the jam." She has a definite idea about a woman's role in the world. "If a woman's children still need her, then her place is in the home. But otherwise she owes it to the community to take an active part in affairs."

"Outside interests make a woman more attractive to her husband and keep her from becoming lonely in old age." The use of an ointment containing one per cent ammoniated mercury is sometimes of help. However, it

Answer: This is due to pigmentation over the area of the burn.
