MacLeod Hurls One-Hitter As Abbies Score 7-0 Triumph

The third game of the Provincial Junior baseball playdowns went into the record books yesterday afternoon but it will be remembered in Island baseball circles as long as groups gather to discuss the highlights of Island baseball achievements.

The Charlottetown Abbies won 7-0 to take a one game lead in the series as Don "Duck" MacLeod hurled a brilliant one-hitter to lead Randy Edwards crew to their impressive win.

MacLeod almost over shadowed his pitching performance by an impressive batting display. He smashed a Dee Lefurage pitch over the centerfield fence near the 350 foot mark in the sixth inning with the ball travelling approximately 275 feet before it touched earth. He also batted out two other hits in four trips to the plate.

The 17-year-old baseball phenom had everything out on the pitching mound. His fast ball was hopping and his curves breaking sharply as he held the Summerside team in the palm of his hand for well over two hours before the great crowd of the season.

Third baseman Grant Grady spoiled MacLeod's bid for a no-hitter. Grady, a left-handed batter, smashed a triple down the right field line in the sixth inning. According to base judge Moe Goodwin, the ball landed about two inches inside the foul line and rolled outside allowing Grady to reach third.

That was the only ball hit to the outfield in fair territory. Left fielder Billy Purcell caught one ball in shallow foul territory but otherwise the Currantites failed to get the horsehide past second base.

The victory gives the Abbies a two-one lead in the best of seven series. The fourth game will be played in Summerside on Friday afternoon.

Dee Lefurage, who won the opening game 1-0 besting MacLeod in a pitchers' duel, pitched for Summerside yesterday and went the route.

He pitched well, although touched for eleven hits, and save for the first and seventh innings held the Abbies in check. Lefurage struckout nine and walked two.

MacLeod had 15 strikeouts to his credit. He walked three and struck one batter.

MacLeod Hurls One-Hitter As Abbies Score 7-0 Triumph

The third game of the Provincial Junior baseball playdowns went into the record books yesterday afternoon but it will be remembered in Island baseball circles as long as groups gather to discuss the highlights of Island baseball achievements.

The Charlottetown Abbies won 7-0 to take a one game lead in the series as Don "Duck" MacLeod hurled a brilliant one-hitter to lead Randy Edwards crew to their impressive win.

MacLeod almost over shadowed his pitching performance by an impressive batting display. He smashed a Dee Lefurage pitch over the centerfield fence near the 350 foot mark in the sixth inning with the ball travelling approximately 275 feet before it touched earth. He also batted out two other hits in four trips to the plate.

The 17-year-old baseball phenom had everything out on the pitching mound. His fast ball was hopping and his curves breaking sharply as he held the Summerside team in the palm of his hand for well over two hours before the great crowd of the season.

Third baseman Grant Grady spoiled MacLeod's bid for a no-hitter. Grady, a left-handed batter, smashed a triple down the right field line in the sixth inning. According to base judge Moe Goodwin, the ball landed about two inches inside the foul line and rolled outside allowing Grady to reach third.

That was the only ball hit to the outfield in fair territory. Left fielder Billy Purcell caught one ball in shallow foul territory but otherwise the Currantites failed to get the horsehide past second base.

The victory gives the Abbies a two-one lead in the best of seven series. The fourth game will be played in Summerside on Friday afternoon.

Dee Lefurage, who won the opening game 1-0 besting MacLeod in a pitchers' duel, pitched for Summerside yesterday and went the route.

He pitched well, although touched for eleven hits, and save for the first and seventh innings held the Abbies in check. Lefurage struckout nine and walked two.

MacLeod had 15 strikeouts to his credit. He walked three and struck one batter.

The Abbies jumped into a 2-0 lead in the first inning. Short stop Jack Kane, who played a great game, drilled a single into left centre and scored when Don MacLeod doubled into right field. MacLeod then came home as Kip Ready blasted a triple down the right field line.

MacLeod made the count 3-0 in the sixth inning. He looked at a ball and then walloped the second pitch far over the centerfielder. Dougie Arsenault's outstretched glove at the fence.
