

Edens Have To Go Hunting For New Home In London

LONDON (CP) — Suez not only flowed through Lady Eden's drawing room. It swept it away.
One immediate task facing the Edens as a result of the prime minister's resignation Wednesday night is to find a new home. They have no home of their own in London.

Lady Eden owns a thatched-roof, two-bedroom cottage called Rose Bower in the Wiltshire hamlet of New London. She paid £4,900 (\$11,200) for it before her marriage to Sir Anthony in 1952 but it is not considered suitable for entertaining or convenience.

Only once in the dark days of the Suez crisis did Lady Eden give a glimpse of the strain she was under as wife of a prime minister under heavy fire both at home and abroad. It was when she wryly remarked:

"I have sometimes felt that the Suez Canal was flowing through my drawing room."

Now 36, Lady Eden is the only daughter of Sir Winston Churchill's younger brother, Maj. John Strangé Spencer-Churchill. She attended an exclusive English girls' school and went to Oxford to read philosophy.
Shy and retiring, she has only

a few firm friends.
Her final task before leaving Downing Street will be to say farewell to the staff of cooks, maids and cleaners. Then she will have to concentrate on house-hunting and assisting her 59-year-old

husband to make a new life.
The latter will be difficult. For Sir Anthony, like his wife, has few close friends and no hobbies. For more than 30 years he has made politics his life.

IN MEMORIAM MRS. THOMAS GORMAN

The death of Mrs. Thomas Gorman occurred suddenly at the Charlottetown Hospital on December 15th, 1956. She was born Amy Letitia Mullen, daughter of the late Peter Mullen, Kensington, and his wife, Elizabeth Kelly of Fort Augustus parish.

On January 29th, 1907, she married Thomas Gorman at St. Mary's Church, Indian River, P.E.I. Seven children were born to them. For twenty-three years she lived in harmony with her husband until his lamented death in 1930 brought unspeakable sadness to her heart.

It was, however, in the designs of God's holy will that she should bear yet other crosses; three sons: Daniel, Gerald and David, all in their twenties, predeceased her — each with great suddenness. In these, her many days of sorrow, she sought and found the Divine consolations necessary to sustain her in her anguish.

She was a quiet kindly woman who loved her family and home. She will be greatly missed, not only by her family and relatives, but by her friends and neighbors, some of whom she had known from her girlhood.
She had been ill only a few days before being admitted to the hospital Friday evening, December 14th. After spending a fairly comfortable night, it was her high privilege the following

morning to receive Holy Communion while in full possession of her mental faculties. Scarcely more than an hour later, while the last Rites of the Church were being administered, her gentle soul was called to its Creator.

Three sons and one daughter survive: George and Louis, Kensington; Charles, St. Jean, P.Q.; and Mrs. Arthur Lawlor, R.N. (Inez), Charlottetown, in whose devoted care she spent her last few days. Two sisters also survive: Miss Edith Mullen, Boston, Mass., and Mrs. S. E. McRae, Los Angeles, Calif.

Her funeral was held from her late residence on Monday morning, December 17th to the Church of the Holy Family, Kensington, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by her pastor, Rev. L. P. Callaghan, D.D. Rev. H. J. Croken, parish priest at Kinkora and a nephew of the deceased was present in the sanctuary. The pallbearers were: Alfred Arsenault, Myron MacArthur, Joseph Croken, Thomas Turner, John Roberts and Earl Brahm. After Mass, the mortal remains of the late Mrs. Gorman were borne in funeral cortege to St. Mary's Cemetery, Indian River and interred at the side of her beloved husband.
