Take the advice of any man on this Island, and well versed in Colonial politics as any man on this Island, and return no member who refuses to pledge himself—heart and brain—to support and carry out that principle to the utmost of his abilities. Adopt this course, and you will certainly obtain his object at last. Suffer yourselves to be amused with any of the minor considerations which are so profusely drawn before you, like straws before a kitten, and you will remain the pointed from despised slaves at whom the finger of scorn will be pointed from every State and Province in North America. Regard not the pretended rights of the land speculators. The Grants have been violated by them, both in letter and spirit, and must fall. Heed not the opinion of your new Governor, so rashly expressed in his last speech—it is merely a melancholy record of the most unsound politics and worst English that ever emanated from the Governor of a British Colony.  
It has been absurdly said, that I am a runaway Canadian rebel. I am in a condition to prove, not only that the accusation is totally false, but that my most strenuous exertions were on the opposite side, during a very critical period of that rebellion. The man who insinuates that I am a rebel, is himself guilty of mis-prision of treason if he does not use every endeavour to have me apprehended and secured forthwith.
