Mr. McKinnon's abilities as a naval architect are well known, as some of the fastest vessels that have ever sailed from this Island to Great Britain were modelled by him and built under his inspection.

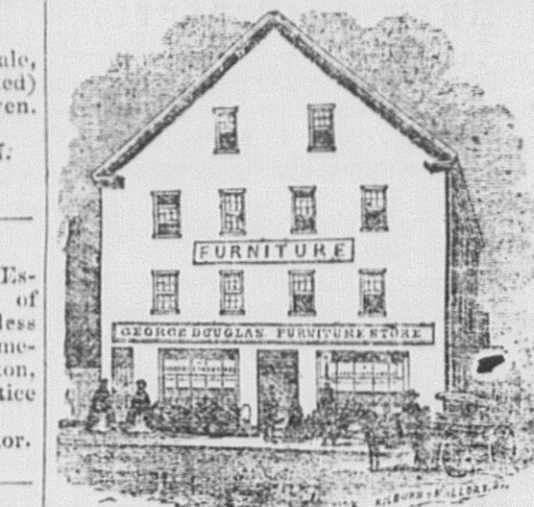
