

Moncton Hawks In Surprising 4-2 Win Over Millionaires

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 15—(CP)—Jackie Gibson, the ex-Sydney goalie, returned tonight to spark Moncton Hawks to a 4-2 win over Millionaires in the opening game of the Maritime Major Hockey League.

The new goalie for Johnny Horeck's Hawks was injured in the third period and received a "hounding" ovation when he returned after treatment.

Horeck, formerly of the champion Charlottetown Islanders, was jubilant over the showing of his squad.

"We just gave the big shots a half-wummy," he said. "The next time out we may give them the full treatment."

Hawks shot into the lead in the closing minutes of the opening period and were never behind after that.

Their opening marker came at 16:20 of that period and then they added another at 6:20 of the second before Sydney replied a little less than three minutes later.

Moncton added another within a matter of seconds to make it 3-1. Millionaires replied two minutes later and then Hawks put it in the bag with a safety shot at 18:26.

For an opening game, it was good. Eleven penalties were handed out.

Gibson made 32 saves to Pidsodny's 22.

Hawks struck first and continued to set the pace even when short handed and had Millionaires a well disorganized unit in the third period.

Dennis Filion, Hawk offensive star, took a breakaway pass at centre ice, drew Pidsodny and slid home the first counter. Hawks were never caught thereafter.

Morey Hamilton doubled the count with a sizzling 30-foot shot from the left boards that settled over Pidsodny's left elbow.

Millionaires grouped their attack when Moncton rearguard Orville (Red) Olson was judged for tripping at 7:42 of the second period.

The heavily-favored Soviet Army team won the title 2-1 over the underdog team from the city of Kalinin.

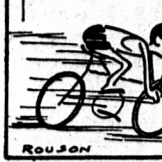

Although it will go down in the record books that the Springhill Tankers were the best junior baseball team in the Maritimes in 1951 it will take a lot of convincing to tell those who saw the teams play over the week-end that the Tankers had anything on the Abbies. They had a little more depth in their pitching staff and were a little more dangerous at the plate but their infield was not as good as that of the Abbies. The outfield would rate about even, about even.

That they are worthy wearers of the Maritime junior baseball crown goes without saying. They fielded a very smart ball club and no doubt the things they learned on the contacts they made with the senior Springhill ball club exceeded them a lot. They had excellent pitching and the benefits of a season's playing together. One of the Springhill boys told Abbies first baseman Des Trainor that they played 60 games this year.

In defeat the Abbies looked almost as good as Springhill did in victory. In fact they were as good for 23 of the 25 innings that the three game series lasted. When the series was over they were the first to congratulate the winners and while everybody loves a winner, they also love a good loser.

The Abbies were as fine a junior team that has been produced here for a long time. They had a great hurling staff in the persons of Benny Carson, Donnie MacLean, Cliff Keady, Jackie Burke and Phil Murphy when they needed him. In Arnold MacCallum they had a receiver that was second to none in Maritime junior competition.

The infield was the core of the team with rangy Des Trainor at first, smooth fielding Lal Hennessey at second, youthful "Duck" MacLeod at short and the eager "Coker" Pineau in the hot corner. They never play better than they did on Sunday as a look at the box scores will tell. They picked up 17 assists in the first game and 13 assists in the six innings they were on the field in the second.

The outfield provided most of the offensive punch although they had their great defensive moments. They were led by the capable Brian Lewis in centre with Joe Coyle, Phil Murphy and Jackie Burke. The outfielders got five of the Abbies six hits in the doubleheader.

No team, no organization would go far if it were not for a capable leader and the leader in this case is Ev. MacNeill. The coach's job is the hardest one in sport. Ev. has worked evening after evening with the boys and the results of his work were quite noticeable. One of the smartest plays that was pulled off Sunday afternoon was the Abbies outfield relay on "Bud" Peck's long double.

The ball was hit hard enough and far enough for a home run in ordinary cases. Jackie Burke went after it, Brian Lewis raced away out for the first relay, "Duck" MacLeod went out for the second relay and the ball was whipped in before the Springhill runner could reach third. On the next play he was doubled off second after Phil Murphy caught an outfield fly and fired to "Duck" MacLeod.

There was another baseball game in Lennox Island Sunday afternoon that caused a lot of interest by the intermediate group of baseball players and fans when the Lennox Island Micmacs defeated the Peakes Bombers in a doubleheader. 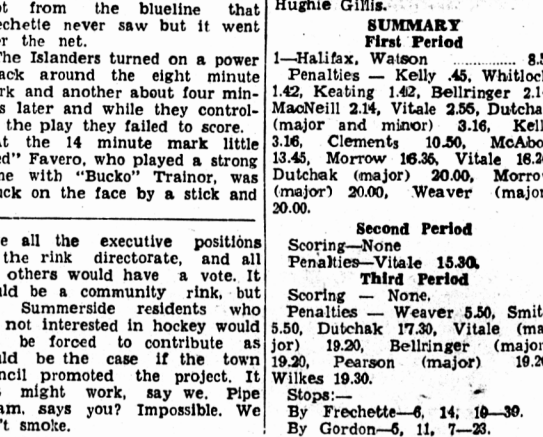
