A SAD death is reported from Ottawa. A young man, 18 years of age, named Menard, a boarder at Galarneau's hotel, on Tuesday morning, was holding a pistol in his hand whilst packing up his clothes. William Galarneau, son of the proprietor, insisted upon seeing the pistol, but Menard refused. Galarneau tried to snatch it out of Menard's hand and the latter held it back. Just at this moment the pistol exploded and the bullet entered Menard's forehead. He died within an hour.

In granting the appeal of fishermen in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, between Point des Monts and Blanc Sablon, the Dominion Government has decided to send immediately a government cruiser to protect those fisheries from the depredations to which they have been subjected at the hands of Newfoundland outlaws, who cross over in large numbers in the absence of any government vessel do as they like, committing outrages that would put a Fiji Islander to shame. Terror reigns supreme and the inhabitants along that part of the coast of Labrador say that they will be forced to leave the country unless they and their families are protected from the outrages they have been subjected to from the Newfoundland pirates during the present season.

THE London correspondent of the St. John Sun says:—"There is a good joke going the rounds touching the strange adventures of a prominent Haligonian (Stephen Tobin) in Westminster Abbey. Our friend, who is noted for his self-possession under the most trying circumstances, while doing the Abbey one afternoon last week, decided to sit through the 3 p. m. service, which, by the way, most visitors avoid. In order to hear the full service to the best advantage, Mr. T. advanced well in front and seated himself close by some other gentlemen. To his surprise he was at once handed a large service, also an illuminated music book; and in an instant it dawned upon him that he was within the chancel rail, and was surrounded by clergy. It was not the place for hesitation, and escape being impossible, our friend joined heartily in the service, timing his actions by those around him. The hardest part was in the "procession" hymn, where he walked side by side with a dignified prelate down the aisle singing (for he sang) "Onward Christian Soldiers," etc. The service over he hurried from the Abbey, and now refuses to enter its doors. Mr. T. regrets that he has not a photograph of the scene; for he holds that it is the first time in many years that a Roman Catholic publicly officiated at a religious service in Westminster Abbey."

THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

The Campaign About Ended.

LONDON, July 15. It is expected that Hubbard, one of the Conservative members for the city of London district, will resign for the purpose of enabling Goschen to secure a seat.

The total of those elected so far is: Conservatives, 308; Unionists, 75; Liberals, 170, and Parnellites, 80.

"Fixing" a Jury.

CHICAGO, July 15. A very sensational discovery has been made by the detectives who are engaged in watching the trial of the Anarchists. It is that an organized attempt is being made to fix the jury. A lawyer and two business men went to John Long, manager of the park theatre, and gave him a copy of the venire of tallmen summoned for the following day, and offered him \$2,000 if he would secure from the list a juror who would guarantee to return a verdict of acquittal, or else secure a disagreement.

Long was asked to see a number of men on the list and fix a half dozen or more, in the hope that at least one would be accepted by the State. Long pretended to agree to do the work and then gave information to the authorities. Fearing the wrath of the Anarchists Long has left the city, and it is not known how the copies of the venire got out of the court. An investigation is now being held. A card bearing a skull and crossbones, and the words, "beware of the avenger of the secret league" was found outside the court house yesterday.

The Rioting in Belfast.

DUBLIN, July 15. During the rioting at Belfast Monday night between Catholics and Protestants four taverns and a number of dwelling houses were wrecked. The police and soldiers charged the rioters several times and at last succeeded in clearing the streets.

Next morning the head constable of Waterford forced a soldier to attempt the arrest of two Orangemen, a father and son. The father shot and killed both the constable and the soldier.

An investigation shows that most of the fighting was done between the police and the Orangemen, the latter having assailed the officers because they had prevented Orangemen from attacking the Catholics.

A policeman named Gardiner, reported as killed, is not dead but is fatally injured. Two civilians, Macwaters and McElroy were shot dead. Fifteen persons are still in the hospital with dangerous wounds. The city is now quiet.

Turning the Tables.

TORONTO, July 15. A Cleveland, Ohio, special despatch says that another Canadian vessel is in trouble there. The schooner Jesse Scarth went to Toledo on Saturday last, from a Canadian port, and for some reason did not report or clear at the Custom House. On arrival at Cleveland the master called on the Collector of Customs who, thinking that the Scarth was an American vessel was disposed to be lenient if the proper papers were obtained from Toledo. The Capt. then took the train to that place and obtained his papers. During his absence the fact that he sails as a Canadian was discovered and he will have to pay a fine of a thousand dollars or else his vessel will be tied up and stripped.

Dementia and Suicide.

NORTH SYDNEY, July 15. A sad case of suicide occurred at Big Baddeck on Saturday last. Seymour Foyle, a farmer who had been in a state of melancholy for some time past, was working on his farm on that day, and in the afternoon he went over to the farm of his brother, who is in British Columbia, and worked there for a couple of hours. Not returning to his tea at the usual time his son went to look for him and found him dead, hanging from a beam in the barn. He had climbed up on a scaffold and adjusting a rope to the beam put the other end around his neck and jumped off. The shock of finding his father in such a position, has affected the son so much that his life is despaired of.

Whitman gets his Deserts.

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 15. Israel McLaughlin alias Whitman, against whom so many charges of attempted outrage on defenseless girls are alleged, and who was convicted at Hampton yesterday of entering the bedroom of Miss Stewart and administering chloroform to her with intent to outrage, was to-day sentenced to imprisonment for life. He has been guilty of the same offence in Truro, Chatham, Newcastle, Woodstock, and in Prince Edward Island, and has already served six years for a criminal assault upon a respected young lady in Carleton, N. B.

MONTREAL, July 15. A charter and contract for the Northwest Central railroad has been granted to Senator Clemons's Company.

Sanford Fleming has gone to England to make arrangements for a cable to be laid from British Columbia to Australia and Asia, to be connected with the C. P. R. telegraph system.

Comte Dugouaze, a French nobleman, doing business as a manufacturer's agent, yesterday committed suicide by shooting, owing to a financial difficulty. His insane act caused great excitement.

A Welcome to Sir John.

WINNIPEG, July 15. Sir John A. Macdonald was given an official welcome here this evening. He leaves for Weston on Friday and will straight through to the Pacific.

The St. Louis Trunk Mystery.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 15. Brooks, alias Maxwell, convicted of murdering Preffer, his companion, has been sentenced to be hanged in August.

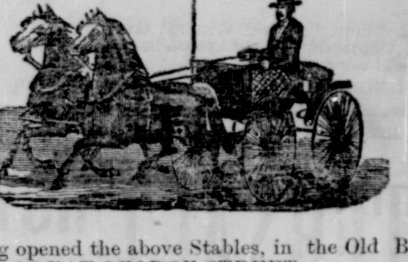
