ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION.

Mr. L. E. Prowse Fittingly Remembered by Friends.

A gathering of the prominent Liberals and others of Charlottetown that almost filled the Legislative Council Chamber assembled yesterday to present L. E. Prowse, Esq., M. L. A. with a public token of the esteem in which he is held by the members of his party.



The Premier, Hon. D. Farquharson, presided, and, after a few introductory remarks, the following address was read and presented to Mr. Prowse:—

ADDRESS: To Lemuel E. Prowse, Esquire, Member, Legislative Assembly:

DEAR SIR,—The Liberal Party of this city, having learned that you intend to take up your residence outside of this Province and thus sever your connection with us politically and otherwise, desire to express our sense of the great loss we are about to sustain. We realize in you one of our most active and useful citizens, and as a representative of this fair city in our Legislature you have been most zealous in advancing its interests, and we voice the sentiments of a great majority of our people when we say that your place will not be easily filled.

We are glad to know that your success in business is such as to induce you to extend its operations to an adjoining province. This is the reward that usually follows fair and honest dealing, and we anticipate and bespeak for you a bright and successful future in your new home. Our great loss is a decided gain to the people amongst whom you are about to live. May a kind Providence smile upon you, Mrs. Prowse and family. Please accept the accompanying gift as a small token of our esteem and respect.

Charlottetown, P. E. Island, Aug. 21, 1900.

A costly watch charm of gold set with a diamond crescent and inscribed with Mr. Prowse's initials accompanied the address. Mr. Prowse said in reply:

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN.—Words fail me at this moment in expressing to my friends my deep appreciation of their thoughtfulness and kindness as evidenced by this beautiful gift and your esteem as set forth in the very complimentary address just read. I will bear with me in memory through life this evidence of my friends esteem, and although I am leaving the Island to take up my residence in Sydney, yet I feel I shall always regard Prince Edward Island as my true and ever loved home.

Well do I remember coming to Charlottetown a few years ago a humble farmer's boy, and whatever success I have attained in business, or as a citizen, I feel I owe much of it to the strong hand of friendship and reciprocal square dealing for fair dealing.

My friends, I find it hard, harder than I ever imagined to leave this favored Island—a land of happy hearts, happy homes and happy people—a people whom to know is to love and esteem. In the church, in business, in the world, in the Legislature, I have always enjoyed the associations of my fellow townsmen, for whom I have the kindest feeling and happiest recollections. My earnest wish is for the advancement religiously, morally and commercially of fair Prince Edward Isle.

And to you, Mr. Premier, I wish to tender my sincerest thanks for your thoughtfulness and kind considerations towards me. Many times I have felt my weakness for the position I occupy as a representative of the people of Charlottetown, but your thoughtful words of encouragement have been a great source of strength to me, far more, sir, than you could ever think, and, as I leave the Island I love so well and the people I love so much. I am sure their best interests will always be advanced by you as Premier of this province, and I hope you will long continue to hold the honored position you now occupy. Thanking you again Mr. Chairman, and gentlemen, on behalf of myself and my good wife for your beautiful gift and your kind complimentary remarks and good wishes and assuring you that they are highly appreciated, I shall always look forward with pleasure to my visits to this Island when I shall see you all again.

Following Mr. Prowse's reply a number of very good short speeches were made by the following gentlemen: Mr Justice Fitzgerald, Mayor Warburton, Rev Mr McConnell, Rev Mr Young, Messrs D O'M Reddin, Geo Stanley, Horace Hazzard, Lt.-Col. Moore, F L Hazzard, D A McKinnon, Charles Lyons, Prof D J McLeod, James Byrne, Benj Rogers, sr, Jas B McLean, James M Lean, of West River, J F Whear and A Down. Three cheers were then given for Mr Prowse and the meeting closed.
