## Senior Baseball

OFFICIALS OF the Kings County Baseball League are interested in forming a three team provincial ball loop—with clubs to come from Summerside, Charlottetown and Kings County.

Games could be played on both week nights and weekends and it has been suggested that mainland teams be brought in for exhibition games.

A group of Charlottetown players have been thinking of forming a team to compete with mainland clubs and the Island baseball back on its feet.

The Island's biggest disadvantage in hoping to form a senior league is the short summer season. The temperatures aren't usually warm enough until late June and then the season is often over before the players begin to feel like playing ball.

P.E.I. weather even at its poorest however, couldn't put the damper on a slate of exhibition games—say for a trophy donated by a sports minded Island firm. Properly supervised and with some publicity, senior ball could also be a big boost for Centennial Year.

We were surprised when Kings County was the first to come up with the suggestion for the Island league. We've been told many times that Kings had the best ball loop in the Maritimes and that they weren't too concerned about ball on the rest of the Island. We're glad they are concerned.

A representative of the Kingsmen told us yesterday that they have come to the conclusion that their county has the best ball players in the province and they want the chance to prove it. We wonder what baseball leaders in Summerside and Charlottetown have to say about this.

## 20 Meets Are Slated

THE P.E.I. division of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada has announced its tentative track and field program for the summer months, including a slate of 20 meets in which the union hopes the Island will be represented.

They include Twilight Meets for Charlottetown and Summerside, the AAU of C provincial championships, meets in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, the Charlottetown Invitational, Eastern Canadian Age Class, national AAU of C championships at St. Lambert's and the National Age Class meet, Winnipeg.

Track and Field clubs to prepare athletes of any age for the meets are now being organized in Summerside and Charlottetown, but there seems to be no attempt in other areas to form clubs.

The AAU of C has suggested Island centres compete against each other in most of the 15 or so meets to be held in P.E.I. and says the top athletes on the individual clubs will be united under the Islanders Club to compete in the larger meets.

## Maritime Marksmen Meet In Annual Contest Sat.

At 10 o'clock Saturday morning 24 of the top marksmen in the three Maritime Provinces will converge on the 200 yard firing point at Squaw Point Ranges for opening shots of the annual Inter-Maritime Rifle Match which will decide the team championship of the Maritimes for 1964.

Each team comprises eight shooting members and a coach and captain from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and the defending champions who captured the ancient rose bowl at Sussex, N.B. a year ago.

The event is the oldest rifle match of its type anywhere in North America, having had its start at Sussex in 1861, at which time it was known as the Inter-Marine Match. It was changed to its present title in 1875 or '76.

In the match each team is divided into four pairs of shooters with each pair firing at a different target at each range, 200, 500 and 600 yards. At each of these ranges each marksman is allowed two sighting shots and seven shot on score, giving a possible total of 35 points and an aggregate possible of 105 points.

The 200 yard range is fired before lunch and the 500 and 600 after lunch. At the conclusion of the 600 yard range, should any of the teams be tied in their overall aggregate, the championship is decided in favour of the team having the greatest total at the 600 yard range.

Cater's first major league homer followed an infield single by Richie Allen in the second inning off Dick Ellsworth. Callison hammered his seventh in the third inning after pitcher Chris Short singled and had been forced at second by Cookie Rojas.

Short yielded a second inning homer to Ron Santo, his first of two, and had a three-hit effort going into the seventh. However, after walking Santo to start the seventh, Short was replaced by Ed Roebuck.

(2) All ages to be taken as of January 1st and to be as follows: Little League under 13; Bantam under 14; Midget under 16; Juvenile under 18; Junior under 20.

(3) Provincial representatives, interested in M.A.B.A. playdowns, to be declared in all brackets not later than the first weekend in September.

(4) All M.A.B.A. finals to be completed no later than the first weekend in October.

(5) There will be no provincial strengthening for M.A.B.A. playdowns.

(6) The provincial-rural intermediate final commences on the second weekend of September to afford the completion of country intermediate leagues.

(7) That provincial finals take preference over M.A.B.A. play-offs where there is a conflict in dates.
