

Providing Newspaper Reading Room At The Ch'town Public Library

Major improvements now under way at the Harris Memorial Library are designed to bring within reach of students and others interested a wealth of information which has long remained dormant in the basement files.

A new exclusive newspaper reading room 42 x 21 feet, has been put out in the basement area where a leisurely examination of copies of Island newspapers may be made on application.

The reading room is equipped with four banks of double fluorescent lights for easy reading. The ceiling and sidewalls are brightly lit and the floor covering is in keeping with the general color scheme.

The 20 steel lockers carrying the bound copies of Island newspapers contain such rare and interesting volumes as a complete collection of the Prince Edward Island Register, founded in 1823 and various other publications right up to the present time.

The microfilm reader installed will be available for use after the formal opening of the new reading room, on a complete microfilm copy on hand of the Island of St. John's Gazette and Miscellany for the years 1782-1793, and also the Prince Edward Island Register for the years 1823 to 1830. Another in-

teresting microfilm has been completed of The Islander for the years 1860 to 1873.

The microfilm reader unit enlarges the film from 35mm and plays the result on a slope plate approximately newspaper size.

Provision is also made in five oversize steel cabinets for the care and protection of larger size publications which appeared from time to time of the press in the early years of the Island.

Superintendent H. B. Chandler, M.A., B.L.S., of the Department of Education under whose supervision the work has been performed, said yesterday that the arranging and placing of files would take considerable time but the formal opening would take place as soon as possible. "The whole history of the Island is contained in these newspapers," he said. "Both Miss Gill, who is associated with me, and myself are looking forward to making this addition to the library available to many students and others interested in our Island's history."

The expense of the extended library service is being borne by the Provincial Government under a special grant set aside by the Legislative Library Committee last year.

Outlines Aim Of Women's Bureau At Club Dinner

The Business and Professional Women's Clubs held their Provincial conference dinner Wednesday at the Charlottetown Hotel. A short business session was joined in by members of the Charlottetown and Summerside Clubs. Miss Helen Yoe, provincial president, presided at the dinner a pleasing feature of which was the presentation to Senator Elsie Inman of the Club emblem. An address of congratulations to Senator Inman was read at the presentation.

The guest speaker for the evening was Miss Marion Royce, director of Women's Bureau, Department of Labor, Ottawa. She was introduced by Miss Jessie Fraser of the Summerside Club. Miss Royce outlined the purpose of the Women's Bureau which is

a new branch of the Department of Labor and has as its objective a better understanding of the problems of women workers and their jobs. Another aim of the Bureau is to promote good labor standards in the field of women employment.

The speaker discussed the subjects which are receiving initial consideration by the Women's Bureau: 1. Married women in employment; 2. The occupation of women and their opportunities in new fields; 3. The earnings of women and the special problem of younger and older women workers. She stated that there are 1,235,000 women employed, one out of every three of which is married.

She emphasized the importance

of education in the solving of labor problems. "Young women should be encouraged to look to all vocations when making a choice," she said. "There must be a partnership co-operation between men and women but above all we must give to the younger generation a sense of values which leave them free to move into a future full of adventurous possibilities."

At the conclusion of Miss Joyce's address Miss Beattie Prosser, vice-president of the Charlottetown Club extended the thanks of the group to the guest speaker. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.
