Satch just chuckled down to the bottom of his oversized shoes. He said his pitch was legal and called it his "hesitation pitch."

Last night Paige came in to relieve Ned Garver in the fifth inning with nobody out and one on. He walked the first batter and Vin Halsall (ML) hit a bunt. Clyde Volmer, whose hitting feats have been sensational during the past month, fanned out.

Next was pinch hitter Charlie Maxwell. Paige ran the count to three-and-two and on the next pitch his foot seemed to stop but his arm continued in a wide sweeping arc that flung a strike past the completely fooled Maxwell. Paige then retired the next batter.

## Traffic At Wood Islands Shows Increase

1,704 more passengers were ferried by the Northumberland Ferries Ltd. during July this year than July of 1950, according to figures released yesterday. The figures also showed an increase of 328 autos and 99 trucks during July of this year.

19,410 passengers, 4,954 autos and 922 trucks were ferried across the Wood Islands-Caribou route last month in comparison to 17,706 passengers, 4,606 autos and 823 trucks in July, 1950.

For the three month period from May 1 to July 31 of 1950 there were 30,703 passengers, 8,035 autos and 2,263 trucks ferried compared to 34,436 passengers, 8,920 autos and 2,337 trucks in the same period this year. That is a gain of 3,733 passengers, 885 autos and 74 trucks.
