Nova Scotia Elections.

HALIFAX, May 21.

The Provincial elections took place to-day and resulted in the Government being sustained by a good majority. In Cumberland the two Blacks are defeated by Oxley and Forrest. Two Liberal-Conservatives are elected in Guysboro, and the father of repeal is defeated. Hants is redeemed by Smith and Macdougall. Dr. McKay is defeated by a large majority in Cape Breton. Following are the returns so far as received: Opposition: Colchester, Longworth reported elected; Cumberland, Forrest and Oxley; Guysboro, Cameron and Morrow; Hants, Smith and McDougall; Inverness, McKen and McLennan, with several districts to hear from; King's, Barclay Webster; Pictou, Grant and Tanner; Victoria, Dr. Bethune. Government: Annapolis, Longley and Chute; Antigonish, McGillivray and McIsaac; Cape Breton, McPherson and Macdonald; Colchester, Lawrence; Digby, Tupper and Comeau; Halifax, Fielding, Power and Roche; King's, Sydney Welton; Lunenburg, Church and Sperry; Pictou, James D. McGregor; Queen's, Hemeon and Hunt; Richmond, Matheson and LeBlanc; Shelburne, Johnston and McCoy, all elected by small majorities. When the full returns are received McCoy may be defeated by Cahon; Victoria, John A. Fraser; Yarmouth, Law and Gayton. Government, 25; Opposition, 13.

Receiving Royalty.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 21.

At noon to-day, the C. P. Steamship Abyssinia, with the Duke and Duchess of Connaught on board, anchored off Victoria Harbor and transferred the royal passengers to the steamer Lorne which conveyed them to this city. The royal tourists were received by the Lieutenant-Governor, Capt. Hu tan, R. M., Col. Holla, R. C. A., Col. Prior and their aides, who, with a few prominent citizens, accompanied them to the ship. Both the Duke and Duchess, as well as all the suite, enjoyed the trip greatly. After a reception at landing, the party were driven to the Government grounds where a civic address of welcome was presented by Mayor Grant. After luncheon at Government House with the Lieut.-Governor, the Prince performed the ceremony of formally opening the Provincial Jubilee Hospital, a large and well-appointed institution just completed at Victoria. The reception was very quiet and unostentatious, but was well taken by the Prince, who is travelling very quietly. He leaves to-night for Vancouver, where to-morrow will be spent; thence the party go direct to Winnipeg.

An Alleged Conspiracy.

SAN FRANCISCO, CAL., May 21.

The Chronicle to-day gives complete details of the alleged conspiracy to capture Lower California and found an independent republic, to be followed by annexation to the United States. The Mexican Land and Colonization Company, composed of wealthy Englishmen owing concessions on the Republic are interested. The officers claim the policy of the Mexican officials in Lower California has been ruinous to the land interests of the company. A lobby has been working at Washington in the company's interests. This prospect of congressional action being unfavorable, a filibustering expedition was fixed upon.

A Big Lawsuit.

HARTFORD, Conn., May 22.

The Phoenix Mutual Life Insurance Co., of this city, controlled by policy holders, has begun a suit for \$100,000 against Aaron C. Goodman, formerly President, to recover the dividends he drew on his stock, in excess of the stipulated six per cent. Goodman held a majority of the Company's stock during the period. Excessive dividends were paid to stock holders. Other directors who voted and drew cash dividends voluntarily restored them to the Company.

The Tariff Bill Passed.

WASHINGTON, May 22.

In the House, the Tariff Bill was passed by a strict party vote, with the exception of Colamen, of Louisiana, who voted with the Democrats in the negative.

The Budget Bill Passed.

LONDON, May 21.

The House of Commons passed the Budget bill to-day.
