An Outrageous Act.

We learn that the Liberal (?) Administration have followed up their dismissal of the School Inspectors by the summary dismissal of Mr. Nicholson. No office in the gift of the Provincial Government is, it seems safe from the attacks of the Party office hunter. If any position in the Province should be kept free from political influences and entanglements it is surely that of the Chief Superintendent of Education. The reasons need not be stated. They are apparent to every man who has the faintest conception of the varied interests with which the Chief Superintendent of Education has to deal. It was supposed, it is believed, that the Government would be actuated by these reasons. But the supposition is proved to be false. As our Liberals were when, for party reasons, they pitchedforked the late Donald Montgomery out of the office of Head Master of the Normal School, so they are now. The good of the country is as nothing in comparison with the demands of their friends who need offices. And, again, it is a son of Belfast who is the subject of an outrage upon the best interests of the Province!

There are one or two circumstances, personal to Mr. Nicholson, which make his dismissal at a month's notice particularly unfortunate. The time has gone by when he can expect to obtain an appointment to another educational position either here or elsewhere. He must now remain idle for nearly a year, or leave (for a time at least) the honorable profession of which he is a member. This, taken in connection with his recent marriage, with its added responsibilities and expenses, renders the outrage in respect to the Province a heartless act in respect to the person. We are mistaken in the people of Prince Edward Island, we have misjudged their ideas of justice and generosity, if the Government—their servants—are not taught, ere long, that they cannot with impunity, commit acts of outrage and tyranny.

Prince County Exhibition

A Large Attendance.

Nearly Two Thousand Exhibits

There was nothing by which to know the exhibitors of flowers, fruits, pictures, or, indeed, anything else on exhibition. So we have to assume that the decision of the judges was right in every case, and that the prize list indicates correctly those whose exhibits were really the best. It is pleasing to note that Mrs. Thomas Welsh and Mr. Adam Fyfe were not alone, by any means, in the exhibition of flowers of the finest description. There was, in truth, a very creditable display of these products and proofs of refined taste, drawn from many sources, including not only Summerside and St. Eleanors, but Miscouche, Malpeque and Kensington. As to the pictures some were very bad and several of the landscape drawings passable and creditable, showing that there is true artistic taste and some artistic ability in our Western County. The show of fruit, if smaller than Prince County ought to make, included many splendid samples of the best varieties. Some of the textile fabrics and wool were in the highest degree creditable to the fair exhibitors, a goodly number of whom are still unmarried. Young gentlemen in search of good wives may read the ladies section of the prize list with interest, and, perhaps, with profit.

Among the carriage colts and fillies which were most admirable were the progeny of Hernando, Administrator, All Right, Crayton, Principal, and Westlawn. A very beautiful filly—full sister of D. J., recently sold for \$1,000—was shown by Mr. Alder Black of Searle town, and Mr. W. Hefel of Travellers Rest exhibited a particularly good filly by Hernando. In the cart classes were several fine colts by the Knight of Ardowan, imported by John Richards, Esq. The Clydesdale stallion shown by Mr. John Macdonald of Summerside was one of the finest ever exhibited there. We missed Mr. Laird's shire stallion Liberty, but Mr. Andrews' fine Percheron stallion, and Mr. DesRoches' excellent horse, with some others, were on the grounds. Notable was a splendid Ardowan mare, shown by Mr. John J. Raynor, of Alberton. Of the cattle, some very fine calves were exhibited by Mr. G. W. Bentley of Kensington, Mr. F. Wooley of North Bedeque, and others; and there were a number of excellent milk cows. But taken as a whole—as before observed—the cattle exhibit was not up to the mark. In sheep there was a very fair competition, the Messrs. Burns being, as usual, leading exhibitors of the long-wool, and Messrs. Frank Glydon, George Compton, Jesse A. Wright, Colin Wright and James Stavert, of the short. The pigs were very fine in point of quality, though not particularly large in point of size or number. Several beautiful Berkshires were shown by Mr. Samuel G. Glydon of Margate, while the Messrs. Thomas Glover and Robert Glover exhibited some good specimens of the white Chester breed.

It was pleasing to note a very creditable collection of grain and grass seeds exhibited by Mr. W. G. Taylor, of North Bedeque; for it shows that our farmers are taking the cue of the Experimental farms, and experimenting for themselves in respect to the varieties of grain, etc., which are best adapted for growth in this Province. Mr. Taylor's collection included samples of the banner oat, the white cluster oat, English two-rowed barley, prolific barley, silver hull buckwheat, new Canadian wheat, timothy seed, Alsike clover seed, etc., and was good in every kind. The grain exhibit was, on the whole, excellent, the leading exhibitors being those whose names appear in the prize list.
