LETTER FROM DR. McNEILL.

OUR INDUSTRIES.

There is a tone of cheerfulness, hope and confidence in the statements of our manufacturers. This is the result of the quiet times which have resulted from the damage done by the commercial cyclones that have raged in the United States and in other parts of the world. But men who put their money into manufactures and depend for their success upon the busy hum of industry and the appreciation and patronage of the people, are not of such stuff as "crackers" are made of. The wonder is that any of them can be grits. We feel sure that no manufacturer is such a fool as to imagine, for an instant, that his business can be extended and made more prosperous by taking away the advantage that he has in the tariff—by "eliminating every vestige of protection." On the contrary, there is infinite danger that our small home manufacturers, valuable as they are to the community, would be speedily wiped out in free competition with manufacturers in Great Britain and the United States, the results of centuries and long periods of protection. How would this eventually affect our farmers? It will be noted that the number of hands employed in our industries runs up into the hundreds. These with their wives and children, in some instances, and their parents and brothers and sisters in others, eat and wear the products of our farmers, who cannot sell so good advantage either in England or the States as they can in the Charlotte town market. Therefore, the larger the Charlotte town market, the better for the farmers; and the more industries and operatives the larger the Charlotte town market will be. Moreover, the Charlotte town manufacturers are valuable as hindrance to high prices; for outsiders will always be ready to take the advantage of us if we are wholly dependent upon them. Again, it is to be remembered that if the country has \$500 and needs a supply of goods which is bought in the States or Europe, it has the goods but it has parted with the money. But if the same sum of money is spent for the same quantity of goods made in this town, then we have both the goods and the money, which is put into circulation and passes from hand to hand relieving the tightness of the times. From every point of view our home manufacturers ought to be patronized so long as they are able to give us as good value, or almost as good value, for our money as outsiders.

We are, certainly not in a position to go very largely into manufactures. So long as the ice blockade prevails for nearly half the year, our output of manufactures must necessarily be very limited, though it is a fact that many products of our industries find even now a paying market in the neighboring provinces. But we think that the number of our industries might be prudently enlarged in some directions. For instance we send away every year tens of thousands of dollars for agricultural implements and machinery. The steel and iron for these things are obtained at our doors, taken away a thousand miles or more into Ontario, made up there, and then brought back a thousand miles or more to this Province. Ontario has, perhaps, the advantage of P. E. Island in respect to wood; but in respect to steel and iron the advantage is—thanks to the National Policy—with us; and it seems as reasonable that we should be successful in a careful venture towards the manufacture of many of our own farm implements and machines.

—Medical Journal of Commerce: Could the medical profession in this and other cities be brought to realize the amount of trouble and annoyance they give to many of their clients by their persistent disregard of ordinary business methods, they would speedily reform their unscientific and procrastinating way of rendering and collecting their accounts. Other professions send in regularly itemized bills of costs that enable their clients to see at a glance the items for which they are called upon to pay. Why, then, should a doctor be entitled to mask his charges under the cloak of secrecy, and demand payment of a lump sum without stating how that sum is arrived at? When only the total is given it is impossible for the client to be certain that some of the amount demanded has not already been paid and not credited, or to find out whether any of the items appear twice. Doctors are not infallible. Indeed in matters of book-keeping they are often careless and inaccurate. Consequently a business man can never feel certain that he really owes the amount he is called upon to pay. If the bill presented is dated back two or three years, the uncertainty becomes still greater, and yet he cannot check the account simply because the doctor shields himself behind the blanket of professional etiquette and refuses to furnish any particulars as to it. Now there is no reason why a doctor should not present a regularly made up bill the same as a lawyer, architect, or any other professional man. If the others conform to business regulations there is no reason why he should not do so also. Professional etiquette is a valuable safeguard in many ways, but when it lends itself to concealment, and possibly at times even to fraud in monetary transactions, it is time that its rigor should be mitigated, and the common doctor recognize this fact the better.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Jan. 23.
A delegation consisting of Sir William Whiteaway, and Messrs. Bond and Morris, go to Ottawa next week to treat for terms upon which the colony may enter confederation. The legislature will adjourn for a month to await their return when it will consider the matter. It is anticipated that the only ground of contention will be a matter of terms. The Merchant's Bank of Halifax will open a branch here.
