**Will Supply Feed For Game Birds**

The emergency so far as game birds are concerned which was caused by the recent snow storms has now passed, but the Fish and Game Association under the presidency of Mr. F. A. S. Jones has swung into action to be prepared for the next time.

Working in co-operation with the Department of Industry and Natural Resources the Association is now prepared to supply proper feed for the birds if they become hard pressed. The feed to be supplied is a mixture of barley and wheat with a 25 per cent content of grit. The wheat has been thoroughly cleaned and contains no seed whatever. Anyone in Queens County knowing of Hungarian partridge or pheasants needing feed can obtain a supply immediately by getting in touch with Mr. Frank A. MacKenzie, 64 Rochford Street, Charlottetown.

In Kings County those wishing feed may obtain it by asking either Mr. James Brennan, secretary of the Kings County Association, or Mr. Alan MacLean, president. Both live in Souris. Up west in Prince County sportsmen wanting feed for the birds can get it from Mr. Norman MacLeod, Jr., secretary, Summerside, or Mr. H. R. Found, president, Ellerslie.

With so many worthy objects for charity in the world, it's a shame to waste effort trying to rehabilitate someone who clearly will not appreciate the effort. This judgment may seem harsh, but it isn't nearly as harsh as the heartbreak that can befall a household through the gullibility of an impressionable father.

If this girl needs help of any kind, you can easily see that she is directed to the proper channels of assistance; your husband isn't one.

DEAR DOROTHY DIX: I will graduate from grammar school this year and am going on to a private girls' school. Some of my friends tell me I'll be better off in the community high school, where I'll mingle with boys and girls. My parents are leaving the decision up to me. The girls' school will have no dances, proms, etc.

ANSWER: Your parents should not leave so momentous a decision entirely up to you. Why not have an interview with the head of the girls' school and let her point out all the advantages she has to offer? Against them, you have only the problem of boys.
