DYNAMITE EXPLOSION.—An Amherst, N. S., despatch says: An alarming explosion of dynamite occurred on Friday afternoon on the site of the Amherst waterworks, situated about three miles from town. While a quantity of dynamite was being thawed in an outbuilding, it exploded with a loud report and blew the building to pieces. It also blew out the windows and door of a newly erected engine house. No one was in the building at the time. Fortunately the workmen had left a few moments before, and no one was injured.

NAVAL.—H. M. S. Magicienne has been ordered to North America and West India Station from the Cape and West Coast of Africa to take the place of the Comus paid off. The Magicienne is a twin screw third class cruiser, the material of the hull is steel, sheathed with wood, and she is bark rigged and has one funnel. She was built at Govan and launched in 1888. Her displacement is tons is 2950. Her length over all is 265 feet, breadth 42 feet, draught of water 17 feet 3 inches. Her arrangement consists of the following: Six 6 inch R. B. L. guns, 5 tons each; ten quick firing guns and three machine; also six torpedoes launching tubes. The Magicienne has a speed of 19 knots.

FIRE.—Shortly after nine o'clock last night in the midst of the storm, as Watchman Merchant was coming along Queen Street, he discovered that the stable of Mr. Charles Hertz, situated in the rear of his dwelling house, was on fire. Mr. Merchant lost no time in giving the alarm, and the firemen were on the scene with all possible despatch. The fire was in the loft of the stable among the hay and straw. It was soon extinguished, not, however, before the roof was considerably damaged. There was no insurance on the building. The origin of the fire is unknown. The last person in the stable yesterday was a boy who went for some kindling about half-past three o'clock.

NARROW ESCAPE.—On Saturday afternoon while two young lads named Jost and Davison were skating about the docks, they broke through the ice off the old barge near the Steam Navigation Company's Wharf, in the track made by the Stanley. Jost was nearer solid ice than Davison, and soon pulled himself out, after doing which he tried to rescue his companion. In falling in the attempt he ran over to the S. Lawrence for help. Engineer Charles Cummings and Geo. Arbuckle hastened to the scene, and at the risk of their lives rescued Davison when he was about going down for the third time. The little fellow, who was very much exhausted, was removed to his home as quickly as possible and medical aid was summoned. It is pleasing to hear to-day that he is not much the worse for his adventure.

HALIFAX, Feb. 1. Rev. A. L. Wylie, formerly pastor of a Halifax Presbyterian Church, died at Great Village on Saturday.

General Telegraphic News.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—Smallpox is spreading rapidly among the 800 Chinese in quarantine on Angel Island. They were landed January 20th, with two cases among them.

ROME, Jan. 29.—The Pope to-day presided at the meeting of the Congregation of Rites, when the canonization of the venerable Redemptorist, Majella, took place. His Holiness was very weak. In trying to enter the meeting hall unaided he stumbled over his robes.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—Right Hon. Sir John Lubbock, K. C. B., P. C., is dead. He was born in 1815. He took a deep interest in the condition of the working people and prepared many important parliamentary bills looking to the betterment of the poorer classes, besides numerous other measures.

QUEBEC, Jan. 29.—According to local papers, Judge Jette has written to a friend here that he is engaged with his colleagues, Baby and Davidson, completing the final report of the Baies des Chaleurs commission, which will be presented to the Lieutenant-Governor within the next fifteen days.

PARIS, Jan. 29.—Mgr. Richard, cardinal archbishop of Paris, who a few days ago received a letter from the Pope in which he was requested to instruct the French clergy to oppose all opposition to the republic and to follow to the utmost the Pope's policy of conciliation, has written a letter to His Holiness declaring that he is unable to communicate to the French bishops the request contained in the Pope's letter. Cardinal Richard gave as his reason for not obeying the mandate of the Pope that he does not consider it opportune to do so.

This reply of Cardinal Richard has made a bad impression at the Vatican, where it is believed that the action of the Cardinal is due to the influence of the royalists.
