Decides To Keep Floating Island

WATERLOO, Que. (CP)—After trying for days to get rid of it, Granby lawyer Gerard Normandin Friday announced he is going to keep an island that was washed up on the beach of his summer home at Waterloo lake, 75 miles southeast of Montreal.

The floating island, complete with evergreen trees and a lush growth of shrubs, was originally a 250-foot square section of land on R. D. Hammond's farm on the opposite side of the lake. It became detached last Sunday after exceptionally heavy rains, and wind pushed it into the little bay where Normandin has his private beach.

Normandin said he will turn the island into a private park, now that attempts to tow it away have failed. He had stationed a bulldozer across the bay to pull the island into deeper water, but on the first attempt Wednesday the cables broke. The island had moved out only 15 feet.

The steadily-decreasing water level made work difficult and the island was moved out Thursday only five feet more. Friday the island was firmly grounded.

"It's a gift of nature," Normandin said. "We can build a bridge out to it, cut down the trees, and turn the land into a terraced lawn or something else. I haven't really thought out what I will do yet."

Heads Canadian Authors Ass'n

TORONTO (CP) — Election of Frank Stilling of London, Ont., as president of the Canadian Authors Association was announced Thursday.

Dr. Stilling, principal of University College and dean of the faculty of arts and science at the University of Western Ontario, succeeds Paul Khnering of Montreal. Active in education, he has been chairman of the Governor General's Literary Awards Board for the last two years.

John P. Hayes of Montreal, vice-president and general manager of the Southern Press, was elected national secretary succeeding Hugh McLennan, of Montreal.

Vice-presidents elected include Helen Creighton, Halifax.

RCN Officer Gets Award From U.S.

OTTAWA (CP)—The navy announced Thursday that Lt.-Cmdr. J. J. MacBrien, 29, of Toronto and Ottawa, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross by the United States.

The first RCN officer to receive the United States DFC, Lt.-Cmdr. MacBrien won it for his services while flying a Panther jet fighter in the Korean war theatre from the U. S. aircraft carrier Criskey during an exchange appointment with the U. S. navy which began in March, 1952.

He was cited for "extraordinary achievement" on Feb. 1, 1953, while leading a flight of jet aircraft from the carrier in a raid against a Communist supply, storage and warehouse area near the town of Funchong on the vital enemy east coast supply route.

The mission was accomplished despite marginal flying weather and heavy anti-aircraft fire with "courageous leadership and outstanding demonstration of pilot skill."

IMPRESSIONS FUNERAL ORATION DELIVERED BY BISHOP McDONALD

The late Bishop Boyle's earnest desire to be buried in Charlottetown, and his solicitude for the priests and people of his diocese during his last conscious moments, were revealed in the course of an eloquent funeral oration at St. Dunstan's Basilica yesterday by the Most Rev. John R. McDonald, D.D., Bishop of Antigonish.

"Eight weeks ago," said the speaker, "Bishop Boyle and I left our Rome on our official 'ad limina' visit to the Holy See. While crossing the Channel from England to France, Bishop Boyle became very ill and, on arrival at Calais, France, he was taken to a hospital. There it was decided that an operation was necessary, and that he could not continue the journey to Rome. He chose to have the operation in London and I returned with him. He entered the Hospital of St. John and St. Elizabeth, which I had entered the Sisters of Mercy. Incidentally—coincidentally one might say—the Sister Matron of the Hospital is Sister St. Dunstan. There the diagnosis was confirmed and there Bishop Boyle received excellent medical and surgical attention and most devoted and kindly nursing care. The surgical operation was successful, but a severe attack resulted in death."

On two occasions, the Bishop was visited by the Archbishop of Westminster, His Eminence Cardinal Griffin. Later, from Lourdes en route to Rome, His Eminence further showed his solicitude by writing the Hospital enquiring as to the Bishop's condition and sending him word that he had remembered him that day in Mass at the Holy Grotto.

During his last days, the Bishop was delirious, but, on several occasions, when his mind was momentarily clear, he made remarks, two of which I think I should relay to you. The first remark that I remember was: "It is good to die in the Marian Year." That remark, so brief yet so meaningful, revealed his deep spirituality and his great love of God's Holy Mother.

The second remark was in the form of a question: "If I died, I will be taken back to Charlottetown, will I not?" manifesting his desire to return to his beloved priests and people and to be buried at home.

During the less serious part of his illness—while I was in Rome—he wrote me a letter in which he said, "Salute for me 'Roma antiquissima, mater mea, et urbs antiqua' Rome most ancient, my mother and city of my soul." Therein he expressed his profound attachment to the Holy City, centre of Christendom and of our Catholic Faith.

LOOKED FORWARD TO VISIT

Highly educated himself, he had a special interest in education at all levels and in all its aspects. To him education was a comprehensive, constructive process of development of soul, mind and body, founded on a true conception of the origin, purpose and destiny of human life. He was alert to modern needs and to changes in educational means and methods, but he knew that there could be adaptation without sacrifice of established principles and ideals.

HIS GREAT WORKS

Under his leadership and guidance, the University of St. Dunstan's notably expanded its educational plant and facilities.

Special mention should also be made of his patient concern for the sick and suffering. This induced him to sponsor the magnificent addition to the Charlottetown Hospital which the Diocese financed with such remarkable success under his wise and prudent administration.

For all his other interests and works, time permits only general reference to his daily solicitude for the welfare of his Diocese and of its priests, religious and laity. To use an epitaph which he himself loved and quoted: "Si monumentum requiris, circumspice" — "If you seek his monument, look around you."

Now, dearly-loved Brethren, the task God gave to Bishop Boyle is done. His forty-one years of dedicated priestly and episcopal service are written forever in the Book of Life. His soul has returned to its Creator and God. His vested body will today be reverently consigned to the grave. The memory of a humble, gentle, learned, zealous pastor of souls will remain.

"O God, who wert pleased that in the apostolic priesthood this thy servant James should be invested with episcopal dignity; grant also, we beseech thee, that he may be joined forevermore to the fellowship of that priesthood in heaven." Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him."

Appeal Cases Heard Yesterday In Supreme Court

Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan (above) presiding at the Queen's County Assizes yesterday heard three appeals and in each case sustained the conviction. In two of them he amended the sentences imposed by Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin.

The case of The Queen versus Leo McGonnell was an appeal from a sentence of 20 days on a charge of drunkenness. The judge upheld the conviction, but amended the sentence to a fine of \$20 or in default 20 days. On a conviction for indecent exposure the appeal of Charles Jackson was denied and the conviction sustained. The original sentence was for six months in jail but Judge MacGuigan amended it to three months in jail or an additional three months in case of default.

Several civil jury cases are on the docket and the petit jury panel will be called this morning to hear the first of the cases. There are no criminal cases at this sitting and no grand jury was summoned.

Certificates are granted to persons who pass examinations for first year work, vouchers for second year, medallions for third year and labels for fourth and subsequent years.

It translates the report into Korean and distributes it to 40 newspapers and 12 radio stations. Kim Dong Joon, KPP president, said "this enlarges the size of our news report 10 times over."

To Attend High School Leadership Training Course

Miss Marie Brown, director, Junior Red Cross in P. E. Island, will head a group of ten high school students from this Province in attendance at High School Leadership Training Centre in Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S., July 6-15, where she will be a Staff member.

The course will be conducted by the Canadian Junior Red Cross and will be the first training centre held in Nova Scotia. Overtures will be made to have the course established in Charlottetown for next year's activities.

Students are scheduled to be present from Quebec and the Atlantic provinces after being selected by the principal and student body of their schools on the basis of leadership ability, personality and interest in community affairs.

The purpose of the course is to develop leaders for organization of Junior Red Cross branches in the schools.

Four guest students from the United States will also be in attendance.

Miss Suzanne Frances, Rochford Square School will be one of a group of six Canadian students to assemble at Quebec following the Leadership Training Courses in various centres to take passage for Sweden in a special meeting there on an international scale.

Exports From Province By Rail Increase

A statement of carloads ferried between Borden and Tormentine released by C. T. Montgomery, Supt. Island Division CNR, for the month of May 1954, as compared with the same period last year, shows an increase of 390 carloads leaving the Island. This year 1612 were ferried, last year 1222.

The increases shown are (last year in brackets): Livestock 101 (88); potatoes 1207 (857); turnips 60 (54); meats 25 (21); miscellaneous 76 (30); roughwood 38 (nil); decreases were eggs 2 (9); fish 1 (3); lumber 3 (11); scrap iron 3 (38).
