Strange But True

Road runner is the name given to a curious bird with a tail about one foot long. It is known in Southwestern United States as the snake killer. In color it is a bronze green, streaked with white. This unique bird uses its wings in running and can keep up with the fastest race horse.

The eggs of a salmon incubate in from seventy to one hundred and fifty days. In their embryo state they resemble tadpoles. The salmon returns as a rule to the river in which it passed its early existence. Salmon have been known to spring fifteen feet out of the water and to describe a curve of 20 feet to surmount obstacles such as falls, etc. when ascending rivers for the purpose of spawning.

The sacred beetle of the Egyptians was regarded with great veneration, and figures of it were worn as amulets. Many of these scarabs may still be seen in Egypt. Sardines are not a distinct species of fish but belong to the herring family. On the east coast of Maine and off the north shore of New Brunswick young mackerel are canned as sardines, but they are inferior to the real sardines of Europe.

What is a sarcophagus? It's a stone coffin. They were found in Egypt in very early times. Some were made of limestone and granite, but the earliest ones discovered were rectangular in shape with a flat or curved bottom.

Most of the paved streets in Salt Lake City, Utah, have a small stream of pure water running along each side, next to the curb, a novel feature seen in no other city.

Each stem of the sago palm yields from 100 to 300 lbs. of sago. This tree grows to a height of 30 feet and is about 20 in diameter. It is cut down at maturity, and the pitch is extracted and reduced to powder, like sawdust. The woody parts are removed, and the meal is laid to dry. As much as 700 lbs. have been obtained from a single tree. Sago is used in the manufacture of coconuts and in some varieties of arrowroot.

Sable Island is a low treeless sandy island off the coast of Nova Scotia, 110 miles southeast of Cape Canso. It is 25 miles long and about 5 miles across its widest belt. So many persons and so many ships have been wrecked there that it often goes by the name "Graveyard of ships."

Rolling stones are stones poised on the point of another rock. When gently pushed by a person's hand they will rock backward and forward. Generally speaking they are due to natural causes, such as decomposition and the action of wind and water.

Strange as it may seem, the first train rails were made of wood, laid end on end, for the wheels of trains to run on. Later flat strips of iron were nailed to the wooden rails, to protect them from wearing. In 1767 the first cast iron rails were introduced, and two years later came flat cast iron rails with an upright flange to hold the wheel to the track. The rolled rail, similar to the one in use today, came into use shortly after 1820.

One of the most beautiful birds found in Central America bears the curious name Quetzal. About the size of a crow, it has gorgeous emerald feathers, from three to four feet in length. The female does not have the long feathers, and is much plainer in her coloration. But the odd thing about the Quetzal is its tiny feet, so small that they are entirely unsuited for walking.

What and where is the Queen's Tobacco pipe? It is the name of a famous furnace in England situated in the Northeast corner of the tobacco warehouses belonging to the London docks, so called because it was once used for burning smuggled tobacco and cigars.

A Quagga is a species of the horse genus, closely resembling the zebra. Though striped on the body, there are no bands on the limbs. The quagga is smaller than the zebra and looks more like a horse. The Boers of Africa hunted it for its flesh and hide, and it is now thought to be extinct.

Supreme Court Rules Against Disorderly Senator

WASHINGTON, 16 — The United States Supreme Court today denied Senator Glen H. Taylor a review of his conviction on disorderly conduct charges in Birmingham, Ala., when he was running for U.S. Vice-President on the Progressive Party ticket.

The Idaho Democrat, running mate of Henry A. Wallace, was fined \$50, and sentenced to 180 days in jail after his arrest May 1, 1948.

The Alabama Supreme Court upheld the conviction of Taylor, who said his arrest would be a test of Birmingham's law requiring separation of Negroes and whites.

Soon after the announcement that the U. S. Supreme Court had refused to review the case, Alabama authorities announced their intention of seeking Taylor's return to that state to face punishment.

In Pocatello, Ida., Taylor had

told reporters earlier that he had no intention of going to Alabama to turn himself over to "that chain gang."

The charges against Taylor were lodged when the Senator tried to enter a Negro youth meeting through a door marked "Negro entrance." He had a scuffle with police and was arrested.

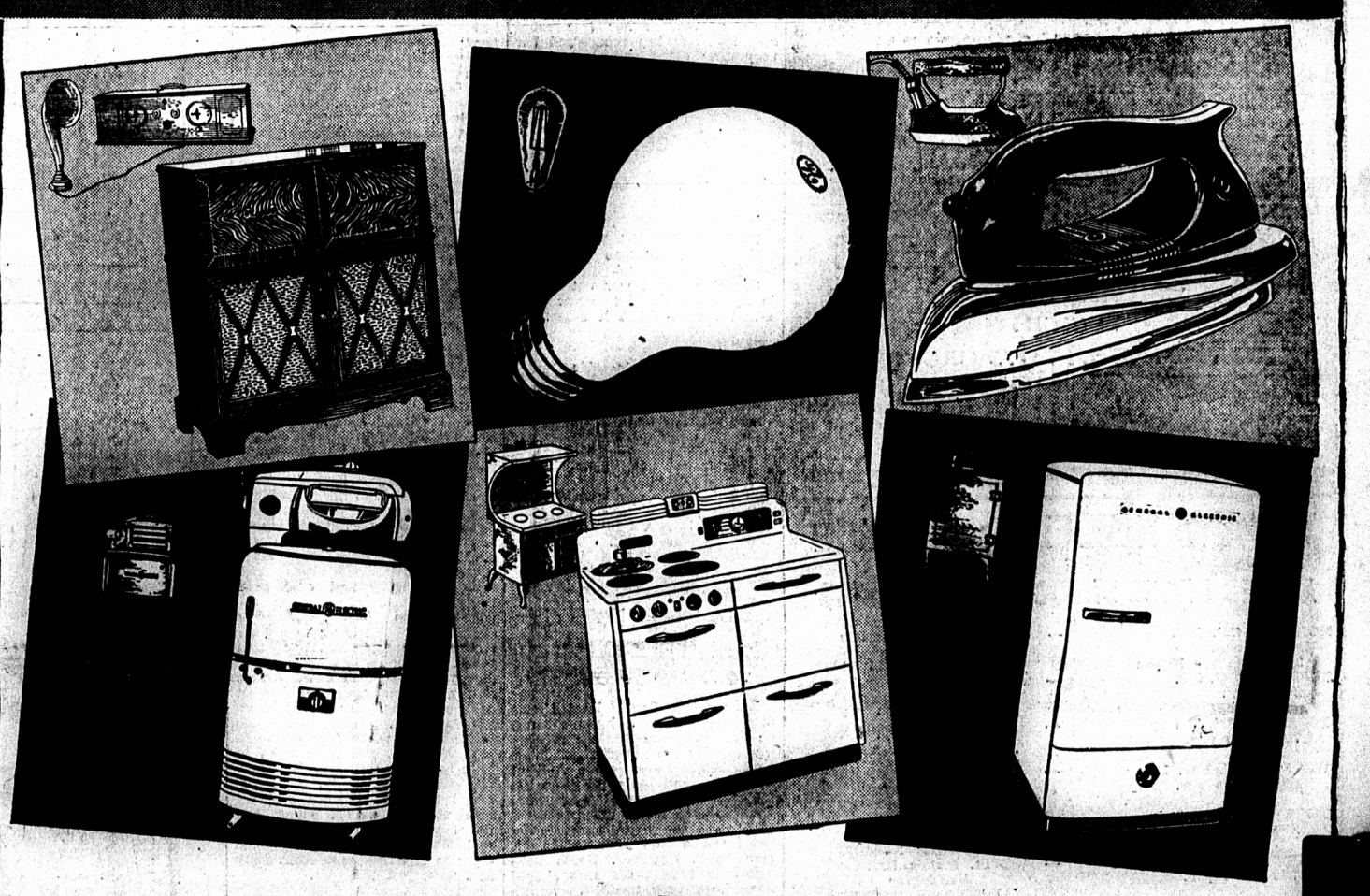
