the Americans and North Vietnamese on the grounds that the Communists were "insincere."

The startling report, written by Alistair Cooke from the UN, added:  
"The natural itch to know on whose say-so Hanoi was thought to be insincere provoked a humiliating private inquiry in Canada, from which it transpired that the only authoritative contact was a minor Canadian official who had personally heard from a deputy town councillor of Hanoi."  
Canada is a member of the international truce supervisory commission in Viet Nam and which has direct access to North Viet Nam.  
The external affairs officials said Canada was not aware of Mr. Thant's efforts at the time they were being actively pursued. Knowledge of these efforts was confined to the parties directly concerned.  
Later, Mr. Thant gave an account of his initiative to Prime Minister Pearson and External Affairs Minister Martin when they were in New York. But this was in March and April, 1965, at least two months after the U.S. had rejected a Rangoon meeting with the North Vietnamese.  
The official said the advice of the Canadian government or Canadian members of the truce commission could not have been and was not offered or solicited in relation to Mr. Thant's proposal.  
The official said the U.S. values Canada's informed judgment on the Viet Nam situation. But the U.S. had many other sources of information on which to base its assessments.  
Mr. Pearson proposed April 2, 1965, a pause in the American bombings of North Viet Nam. Five days later, the U.S. committed itself for the first time to unconditional negotiations and carried out a five-day bombing pause the following month.

## Carloadings Down In Aug.

OTTAWA (CP)—The national rail strike involving the CNR, CPR and six smaller lines dropped railway carloadings for the 10 days ending Aug. 31, to 73,332 cars, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported.  
The strike began Aug. 26 and lasted about a week.  
Total carloadings in 1966 up to the start of the 10-day period were 5.6 per cent above those in the same period a year ago. The strike reduced the 1966 lead as of Aug. 31, over the corresponding 1965 period by 96,136 cars to 3.8 per cent.  
Among commodities contributing to the overall 1966 increase were: wheat 238,008 cars versus 166,589 in 1965; pulpwood 103,997 (94,616); autos, trucks and parts 47,704 (40,562); and fertilizers 58,179 (47,532).  
Items requiring fewer cars included: iron ore 282,615 (301,957); building sand, gravel and crushed stone 96,859 (105,965); and miscellaneous carload commodities 301,127 (315,065).

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

West dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

**NORTH**  
♠ K 7 5 2

The bidding:  
West North East South  
1♥ 1♠ 2♣ 1♠  
2♦ 1♠ Db♠ 1♠ Db♠

Opening lead—king of clubs. This hand occurred in the Trials played in Dallas in 1964. As usual, there were many different results at the nine tables where the deal was played.  
Four pairs got to game with the East-West cards—two of them in hearts. All these pairs went down either one, two or three tricks.  
Three East-West pairs bid and made a part score contract, while one wound up in the highly peculiar contract of four diamonds, down two.  
It was the ninth table which provided the most bizarre result. Here, to their ultimate regret, North-South bought the contract for two spades doubled on the sequence shown. North's bidding was rather aggressive and he eventually had to pay a heavy penalty for it.  
The defense was first-rate. West led the king of clubs and then shifted to a heart. Declarer took it with the king and led the jack of diamonds, playing low from his hand after East had followed low. West took the jack with the queen and played another heart, taken with the ace.  
Declarer led a low diamond from dummy. East going up with the ace and returning a club to the ace. West cashed the queen of hearts, on which East discarded his remaining club, and West then led the jack of clubs. When dummy ruffed with the deuce, East overruffed with the eight.  
By this time eight tricks had been played and South's last five cards were all trumps. East returned a diamond, which declarer had to ruff, and South was then forced to lead a spade to the king and ace.  
Another diamond return forced South to ruff again and lead from the J-9 of trumps to the Q-10. As a result, East scored all four of his trumps and South went down four—1,100 points. It was a heavy penalty to pay for contesting a part score.
