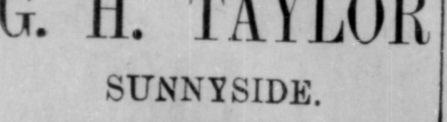

THE CANADIAN.

Although June is the wedding month, The Canadian Magazine in its current issue, has nothing particular to say on the subject. Nevertheless the number is an attractive one, containing a splendid short story by Gilbert Parker, three French-Canadian sketches by different writers, two instalments of continued stories, and a number of splendid articles. One of the most interesting of the latter is entitled, "With Rifle and Rod in the Moose Lands of Northern Ontario." It is illustrated with numerous photographs of waterfalls, rapids, canoeing experiences and camp-fire scenes. Another very attractive article is an illustrated description of our spring garden birds, by Mr. C. W. Nash, whose recent book on birds, issued by the Ontario Government, has attracted much attention. Among the other contributors are the late Senator Boulton, Beckles Wilson, Prof. William Clark (the new President of the Royal Society), Florence Hamilton Randal, A. H. U. Colquhoun, Arthur J. Stringer and John Stuart Thomson. The Canadian Magazine is now in its thirteenth volume.

LADIES' HOME JOURNAL

The June Ladies' Home Journal reaches the top notch of excellence in both its pictorial and literary features. It opens with a page drawing of Longfellow's "Evangelist," and gives a group of pictures showing some "Fetes of College Girls." An interesting description is given of "The Creole Girl of New Orleans," and "Housekeeping on an Ocean Steamship" is graphically portrayed. "How a Young Man Can Work His Way Through College" has a practical value for every poor boy ambitious for higher education, and "Telling the Character from Handwriting" is interesting and entertaining. Bishop, priest, rabbi and minister contribute to a symposium on "What is the Good of Going to Church?" and the Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, D. D., discusses "Pains that Polish Perfection." The fiction of the June Journal includes the second installment of Anthony Hope's "Captain Dieppe," Sophie Sweet's story, "The Revolt of Sar' Abby Quint," the first of "Ol Peckham's Opinions," and four chapters of "A College Courtship." There are two new departments: "Five Minute Talks on Good Health," by expert physical educators, and a boy's page, to which Dan Beard contributes an illustrated article on "A Boy's Underground Clubhouse." Hints For Creamery Men.

The Elgin (Ont.) Dairy Report remarks that:

"There is nothing like a little backbone at the receiving can for improving the quality of the milk. The farmers seem to think that they have but little to do as far as the manufacture of butter is concerned; when they have milked their cows, whether it be done properly or improperly, and furnished a certain amount of raw product, that they have done their share and the creamery man must do the rest of the work, and that it is not a part of their business to improve, whereas the improvement must begin at the bottom, that is, the foundation, the cow and the milk she produces. If the creamery man was more strict in enforcing what he knows to be the proper rules for the production of milk by his patrons, he would have a better product and necessarily would make better butter. It is only by continual and perpetual vigilance that the creamery man can secure the best raw product and only by the same methods that he can be sure of always making the best product. A cent a pound added to the value of the butter produced in the Elgin district, would have amounted to a vast sum, and what would it have been for the whole country? Consider this for a moment and see whether you and your factory and your patron cannot secure by a little extra care that extra cent.

A NOVEL SENTENCE.—Two Galician boys were brought before Mr. Justice Bain, at Winnipeg, charged with breaking into A. B. Call's shop and stealing goods therefrom. They pleaded not guilty, but after hearing the evidence of the prosecutor His Lordship found them guilty. He decided however to let them go on suspended sentence on account of their age on condition that the father, who was in court, took them back to jail and there gave them a good whipping.

AN ORIGINAL IDEA.—George F. Hussey, jeweller, of Haverhill, Mass., had an Easter window recently that caused a good deal of talk. Besides Easter flowers, it contained nothing but the business cards of every firm on the street, giving each a free blow at the expense of the jeweller. It contained no reference to the store, but all of its direct competitors were remembered. When the window was changed the cards went to those they advertised. Mr. Hussey was asked by a reporter why he did it, and simply said: "It was an original idea, and I felt like a man who wanted to blow himself on his friends. They all got an 'ad' and I will pay the bills."

HOW TO GET TO CHARLOTTETOWN

The steamer Halifax leaves Boston for Charlottetown every Saturday at noon and will be due at Charlottetown on Monday night. On the following Tuesday at one she will leave on return to Boston. Halifax and Port Hawkesbury are called at every trip. Passengers may take the steamer at any of the ports mentioned. The Halifax will be supplemented by the Grand Duchess later in the season.

The steamer City of Ghent plys between Halifax and Charlottetown each week, calling at several ports en route. She is due here every Thursday.

The steamers Coban, Bonavista, Campana, Tiber and Polino, of Montreal, also make Charlottetown a port of call.

Passengers for this Province coming by way of Pictou are brought to Charlottetown by the steamer Princess. Those coming by way of Point Du Chene connect with the steamer Northumberland, and may come through to Charlottetown by the mail special which leaves Summerside each evening immediately after the steamer reaches that port.
