COMMITTED TO THE DEEP

A BURIAL SERVICE AT SEA MOPRESSIVELY SOLEMN.

Crew and Passengers Alike Feel the Solemnity and Heedless Sobered on Such Occasions—How the Captain Feels for Days After the Rite is Performed.

An old sea captain said in a recent talk: A burial at sea surpasses the ceremony on land in point of solemnity as much as the awful grandeur of mid-ocean surpasses the mild, soft beauty of a tranquil lake. You can depend upon it, that no matter how rough and hardened the sailor, he takes off his hat and bares his head to the pitiless sky whenever he passes the corpse.

He was a grand surprise, as he was a man, not only of brain and brain, but remarkably well dressed and thoroughly intelligent. He seemed rather suspicious, but thawed easily under gentle influences. The truth involuntarily leaked out that he rarely got home until midnight. I did not wonder. I only wondered that he ever went home. I don't think I would have cared to go.—Cincinnati Tribune.
