CANADIANS ABROAD.—A Melbourne, Australia, paper, at hand this morning, contains a glowing account of a ball lately given in that city by the Canadian Club. American flags were also draped at the doorways, and were caught together by large shields in the form of the maple leaf. The platform, whereon the band was stationed, was decorated with pot plants and ferns. A Canadian snow scene, showing a wigwag, canoe and living inhabitant, formed a very unique and interesting background. His Excellency Sir W. F. C. MYSTERY OF THE CANDY.

No Further Developments.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 8. The inquiry into the death of Mrs. McKie lasted until after 11 o'clock to-night. Still nothing of importance was brought to light. W. F. Best, analytical chemist was about the most important witness. He said that he had discovered strychnine in sufficient quantities in the stomach of the deceased to cause death, and also that in the confectionery handed to him as received by Rev. Messrs. McRae, Dunstadi, DeSoyre and Shaw there was strychnine on each piece ranging from half a drachm to two. Who gave the information which led to the arrest of McDonald is still a deep mystery. The investigation will be continued to-morrow night.

French Politics.

PARIS, Oct. 8. The Conservatives worked with the Boulangists to obtain a revision of the constitution. That measure is now buried, and the Conservatives will resume their liberty of action. The Soleil Orleanist says it considers Boulanger as good as dead. A council of ministers was held at the Elysee to-day. It was decided to convene the chambers during the first week of November.

More Good Racing.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Oct. 8. The Futurity Stake Race trotted here to-day was arranged for three-year-olds, and there were candidates from California, Kentucky and Pennsylvania. A silver cup valued at \$1,000, and \$3,738 cash, went to the winner, \$1,065 to the second, and \$54 to the third. Margaret S, the California representative, won in three straight heats. Time, 2.23 1/2, 2.23 1/2, 2.24.

To Shorten the Road.

OTTAWA, Oct. 8. It is reported that the Canadian Pacific Railway will abandon the present railway through the Rocky Mountains and build a new road through the Crow's Nest Pass, near the American frontier. It is claimed that by that means the route through the mountains can be much shortened.

LONDON, Oct. 8. The Daily News prints a letter from Crete which confirms the report that Chakir Pasha, the Governor, has allowed Turkish troops to pillage and persecute Christians after gaining their confidence by promises of protection. The letter describes the atrocities in detail.
