The Greatest Railway Company in the World.

There are one or two Western American railroads which in extent of line owned and controlled are not far behind the 5,000 and more miles of the Pennsylvania; but as there is as much difference between populous Pennsylvania or New Jersey, and Wisconsin or Nebraska, or between Middlesex and Galway, it can be well understood that the \$21,500,000 gross revenue earned by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and its offshoots during the past year is a total quite without parallel either in the new or old world. Indeed we may safely say there is not any stock company in the world which has ever controlled so large an income. Our greatest Company—the London and Northwestern Railway—last year earned a gross \$10,700,000, or, including "controlled undertaking," possibly \$12,000,000, while on the continent the most important line—the Paris, Lyons, and Mediterranean—earned a gross \$14,000,000. But such figures are a very long way short of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company's receipt.
