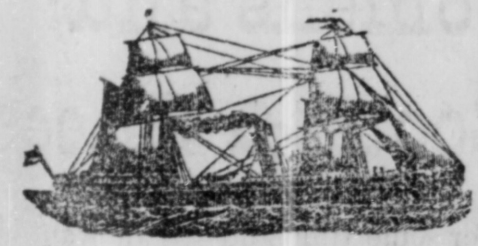

THE ENGINEERS INSPECTION.

The Charlottetown Engineers, under command of Major Weeks, were this forenoon inspected at Victoria Park by Captain Twining, R. E., Kingston. The corps paraded at the drillshed at 9 o'clock whence they marched to the park. There was a good turnout of both officers and men. The exercises of the inspection began with the receiving of the inspecting officer at the general salute, after which the arms and accoutrements were minutely examined and found to be in excellent order and condition.

After this examination, the corps formed in two companies, the quarter column on No 1 wheeling to the left and taking up position preparatory to the march past. The ranks then changed and marched past by the left, after which the ranks again changed and took up their former positions.

After this portion of the inspection was over the corps was put through manual and other exercises by their officers.

The inspection throughout was most exacting, and officers and men alike acquitted themselves in a manner that was in the highest degree creditable. The company presented a splendid appearance on parade, and their clothing and arms were as clean and bright as it was possible to make them. Major Weeks and his associate officers as well as the men of the corps are to be congratulated.

After the inspection at the Park and luncheon at the drill shed the corps marched to Belvidere where they will construct a single lock bridge with trestle and crib approaches. The bridge is to be 75 feet in length.

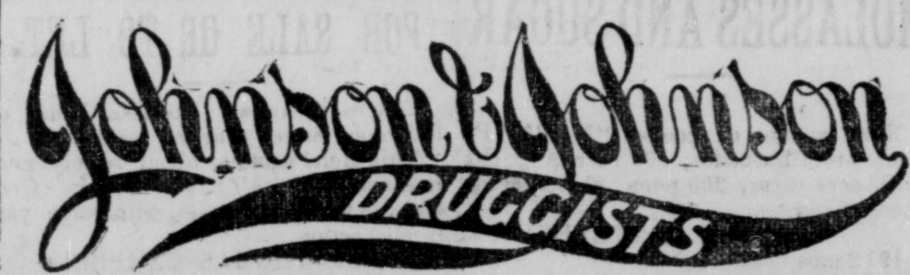

Local and Other Items.

FROM MONTREAL.—The Campagna was in port last evening.

MORE LIGHT.—Mr James Waddell, manager of the Royal Electric Light is to-day installing a new 2000-light machine.

SHIPMENTS ABROAD.—The cargo of the City of Ghent included 90 barrels potatoes for shipment to the Bermudas, 30 cases of lobsters for Demerara and a shipment of lobsters for London, Eng.

QUEEN SQUARE SCHOOL.—The boys of Queen Square School are having their annual sports this afternoon. Headed by a drummer they paraded from the school to the C A A track at one o'clock.

SCHOOL OF EQUITATION.—The School of Equitation closed to-day, with an inspection of the members of the class by Captain Forester. The inspection, we believe, was most satisfactory. Captain Forester and the detachment of Dragoons will leave on Monday for Toronto.

THE OPERA HOUSE.—The next attraction at the Opera House will be "A Trip to Coontown," which opens on Wednesday evening next. The performance is most amusing throughout, and is highly spoken of by Island visitors to Halifax, where the company has been playing to crowded houses.

POLICE COURT STATISTICS.—There were 48 cases disposed of at the Police Court during the month of September. There were 22 convictions for drunkenness, 11 for larceny, 5 for nuisance and 1 for non-payment of dog tax. There were eight dismissals, 1 each for drunkenness, vagrancy and violating the Liquor Regulation Act, 3 for assault and 2 for larceny. One prisoner was sent up for trial in the Supreme Court. The receipts amounted to \$205.45.

COUNTY COURT.—The October sittings of the County Court of Queen's County will be held as follows 1st sitting at Eldon Tuesday 4th; 2nd sitting at Bonshaw Friday 7th; 3rd sitting at Dunstaffnage Tuesday 11th; 4th sitting at New Glasgow Friday 14th; 5th sitting at Cliffton, New London Tuesday 18th; 6th sitting at Charlottetown Tuesday 25th.

Saturday 15th October, instant, is the last day for serving writs of summons for the Charlottetown circuit.

MR. SULLIVAN'S DEATH.—The sudden illness of Mr John P Sullivan, of St Peter's Bay, to which reference was made in our last issue, terminated fatally about 2.45 yesterday afternoon. An internal hemorrhage, the result of a rupture of one of the arteries leading to the heart, is believed to have been the cause of death. After death the body was removed to the residence of Chief Justice Sullivan, from which the funeral took place to the railway station at 7 o'clock this morning. The interment will take place at St Peter's Bay to-morrow. Superintendent Sharp very kindly placed his private car at the disposal of Chief Justice Sullivan and the funeral party.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—A young man, son of Mr Dennis Rooney, of Montague, was accidentally shot a few nights ago. It seems that the sheep in that vicinity have been worried considerably by dogs of late, and some of the people went gunning for the offending canines. One of these, a brother of young Rooney's, saw something moving about his yard near a wagon which he thought was a dog, and fired in the direction of the object. Some of the shot with which the gun was charged found a lodging place in the legs of young Rooney, who, in the darkness of the night, was mistaken for a dog. At latest accounts the young fellow was doing very well, and was expected to be all right very soon.

A SOUVENIR.—A handsome souvenir of the American biograph, the motion picture machine which is at Keith's, is being sent around to the patrons of the house and others. It is a handsome little brochure, beautifully printed and tastefully bound, and contains thirteen half-tone enlargements from the original photographs of the Prince of Wales leaving Marlborough house, Capt. Dodd and the third troop of cavalry making a charge, President McKinley on the lawn of his Canton home, the famous Haverstraw tunnel, Gen. Lee leaving the Hotel Inglaterra, Havana the Prince of Wales' tea party, Clarence House gardens, Theodore Roosevelt descending the steps of the State building, Washington, the disappearing gun at Sandy Hook, Capt. Sigbee of the Maine leaving the Navy Department building, Washington, Joseph Jefferson in the toast scene from Rip Van Winkle, Marshal P. Wilder giving facial expressions, Kaiser William of Germany leaving the Museum at Buda Pesth and the wreck of the Maine as it appeared in Havana harbor shortly after the catastrophe.
