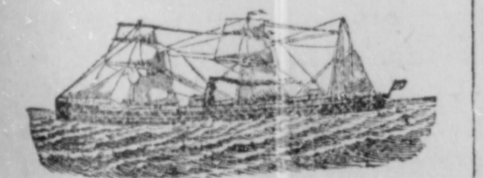

ELECTRIC LIGHT SPORTS.

A Large Crowd Witnesses Some Good Racing.

The electric light sports on the C. A. A. track last night were well conducted and very successful. The grounds were well lighted and the track was in good condition. The attendance was large. The grand stand was filled to overflowing, and many who sought a resting place thereon were unable to find one.

The races, throughout, were closely contested and although the Island boys failed to win the lion's share of the prizes they made a splendid showing.

In Dick Mitchell, of Guelph, Ont., they found a very stiff opponent. Mitchell captured first place in the half mile, one mile and five mile bicycle events, and won second prize in the two mile. He also went a mile against the clock, and covered the distance in 2.06 1-5, beating the Maritime record by 5 4-5 secs. He got a flying start, and for the first half he was paced by a triplet and for the second by a tandem. The provincial record for this distance was 2.14, made at Summerside a few days ago by W. F. Mitchell, Dick's elder brother.

In the second heat of the half-mile bicycle, Pictou Brown went over the bank and damaged his wheel so badly that he had to ride a strange one in the subsequent events in which he figured. But he gave a splendid account of himself under the circumstances, and in the five-mile race was only defeated by Mitchell by a few feet.

Ivan McKinnon, a Charlottetown boy won the two-mile handicap from Dick Mitchell by a short distance. In this event W. F. Mitchell, Sellar and Gaudet, were thrown from their wheels when the race was nearly finished, and Mitchell had one of his legs slightly injured.

The following summary shows the result in the several events, in each of which there was a good field of starters.

Half mile bicycle—First heats: 1st, Dick Mitchell, Guelph, 2nd, C M Clarke, Charlottetown, 3rd, Fred Scott, Moncton; time, 1.11 1-5. Second heat: 1st, F R Newsome, Charlottetown, 2nd, M L Gillis, Boston; 3rd, W F Mitchell, Guelph; time, 1.10 3-5. Final heat: 1st, Dick Mitchell, 2nd, F R Newsome; 3rd, C M Clarke; time, 1.12 1/2.

One mile bicycle, (handicap)—1st, Dick Mitchell, 2nd, W F Mitchell; 3rd, M J Gillis; time, 2.25 1/2. The two Mitchells started scratch; Gillis had a handicap of 15 yards.

Two mile bicycle, (handicap):—1, Ivan McKinnon, Montreal; 2, Dick Mitchell; 3, C M Clark; time, 5.11 1/2. All the winners started scratch; the handicaps ranged from 25 to 50 yards.

Five Mile Bicycle (handicap)—1, Dick Mitchell; 2, Pictou Brown, Charlottetown; 3, Ivan McKinnon; time, 14.56 1/2. The winners were all scratched; the greatest handicap was 150 yards, and the least 50.

(880 yards flat race)—1, H H Johnson, Parrsboro, N.S.; 2, L B McMillan, Charlottetown; 3, D A McKinnon, do; time 2.05. There was very little difference between the three at the finish. It is said that Johnson's time knocks three seconds off the Island record for that distance.

440 yards flat race,—1, C J McMillan, Charlottetown; 2, Parmenas McLeod, Georgetown; time 55 seconds. These two were the only starters. McMillan started at scratch, and McLeod had 15 yards.

220 yards flat race—1, G L Collings, Boston; 2, W H Ritchie, Charlottetown; 3, H H Johnson; time, 24 sec. Collings and Ritchie each had a handicap of 4 yards; Johnson started scratch.

Between the different events on the card, Galbraiths Band furnished choice music; and at the conclusion of the sports there was a display of fireworks.

These special trains from the west brought 100 excursionists. It left on return about half-past eleven.

SEWERAGE CONSTRUCTION.—The contract for the sewerage construction is expected to be awarded in a week's time. In the course of about ten days the first lot of pipe will arrive, and work will probably then begin without further delay. If possible, the five miles projected for the fall, will be laid down; but as the progress of the work will depend upon the weather, it is not safe to say whether it will be accomplished before winter.
