**DON CAMPBELL** — Born in Calgary, Alta., on Nov. 21, 1929. Don moved out of the West as a youngster to play with the Stratford Kroehlers in Ontario at the age of 19. The following year he played with St. Catherine's Teepees and the next season goalied the Grand Rapids team to the International League championship. Last season he played with the Boston Olympics. Don came here this year from Toronto. In the summer he plays lacrosse.

**MURPH CHAMBERLAIN** — Christened Erwin Groves but known in hockey circles as Murph or Hardrock, Chamberlain was born in Shawville, Quebec on Feb. 17, 1915. Murph spent 12 years in the National Hockey League during which time he became well known to every follower of big league hockey. He started with the Toronto Maple Leafs where he spent three years and was traded to the Canadiens where he stayed for eight seasons with time out for a year in Boston. Following the termination of his N.H.L. career Murph turned to coaching and his first job was at Sydney with the Millionaires in 1949. He guided the Millionaires to the Maritime championship and the next year came to Charlottetown. Murph built the Islanders into the most colorful and one of the strongest teams seen in the Maritimes that year. After establishing his reputation as a coach Murph was called to the west coast and the coaching job of the Vancouver Canucks. Following a year in Vancouver he went to Buffalo last season. Murph runs a 500 acre farm at St. Sebastian, Quebec and owns a big herd of pure-bred Holsteins.

**WIMPY STEVENSON** — Born in Davidson, Sask., July 18, 1930. Height 6'. Weight 195 pounds. Wimpy broke into hockey with the Prince Albert Juniors. Following a year in junior hockey he played with the Johnstown Jets in the Eastern Amateur League and last year turned pro with Buffalo at which he was assigned to Springfield. This year he will form one of the Islanders defense units with Larry Travis. Wimpy is quite a baseball pitcher, having played with Estevan Maple Leafs of the Western Canada Professional League for the past two years. He is the property of the Pittsburgh Pirates and attended the Pittsburgh camp last spring.

**LARRY TRAVIS** — Born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, on Nov. 29, 1927. Height 6'. Weight 185 pounds. Larry holds the unique distinction in Maritime hockey of being selected on an All Star team every year he performed in the seaside provinces. This is his fourth season in the Maritimes and his third in Charlottetown. The hockey trail for Larry started with the Winnipeg Junior Rangers in 1944. Three years later he turned pro with the Oakland Oaks of the Pacific Coast League and the following year played with Springfield and Fort Worth. From Fort Worth Larry came to North Sydney and then to Charlottetown. This year he is attending Prince of Wales College where he is completing a pre-med course before starting medical studies next year.

**BOB GRAY** — A versatile athlete who is equally at home on the ice lanes or golf links. Bob plays both defense and forward and this year will play forward. He had four years of junior hockey with St. Mike's, Edmonton, Oshawa and Brandon before he moved into senior competition with the Saskatoon Quakers in 1948. The following year he played with Sydney Millionaires as a defenseman when that team won the Maritime championship. The next year he came to Charlottetown but was traded to Glace Bay. Last year he returned to the Islanders following a bitter Charlottetown-Glace Bay dispute. Bob was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, on March 14, 1928. He is 6' 1" in height and weighs 185 pounds. Last summer he had an outstanding season in golf especially in the Canadian Open in which he advanced to the quarter finals.

**GARY GORDON** — Born in Toronto on October 18, 1929. Gary played his junior hockey with Barrie Flyers under Happy Emmes. From Barrie he went to Springfield before going to Vancouver last season. He plays right wing, stands 6' and weighs 180 pounds. Last summer he played senior B football in Toronto.

**CECIL DOWLING** — Born in Charlottetown, April 10, 1928. Height 5' 7". Weight 160 pounds. Bubby is well known in local hockey, golfing and business circles. He played all his minor hockey in the City and moved into senior competition with North Sydney in 1947. The following year he played with Saint John Beavers and Stelarton Royals. Two years ago he played with the Islanders during the first half of the season and last year he played intermediate hockey. He has been golf professional at the Green Gables Golf Course for the past four years and is the owner of Dowling's Sport Lodge in the City.

**ORVILLE KELLY** — Born in Temiskaming, Quebec, on August 27, 1928. Crusier has been a defenseman throughout most of his hockey career but tonight will start off as a centreman. He commenced playing junior hockey with the Windsor Spitfires and from Windsor moved to Galt. The following year he played with Porcupine when that team won the N. O. H. A. championship. Three years ago he played in North Sydney and for the past two years performed with the Johnstown Jets in the Eastern Amateur League. Crusier is a big fellow for a forward, standing 6' in height and weighing 185 pounds.

**HOWARD "HUB" BEAUDRY** — Born in Garson, Ontario, June 19, 1929. This is Hub's third season with the Islanders and the young centreman has built up quite a reputation in Maritime hockey as a penalty killer. Hub is also quite good offensively as he proved last Friday night by scoring three times in the Garnet and Gold game. Beaudry started with Fairbridge, in junior hockey and later moved to Owen Sound for two years in the O. H. A. Hub plays quite a bit of baseball in the Northern Ontario League. A slinger he led his team in the R.B.I. department.

**LOU KILEY** — Lou is the only Maritime born defenseman on the team. He was born in Saint John, N. B., on May 30, 1930, stands 5' 10" in height and weighs 175 pounds. He played junior hockey in Saint John before moving on to Three Rivers, Quebec, for a season. He played with the Shawinigan Falls Cataracts of the Q.S.H.L. two years ago and with Boston Olympics last year. This year Lou will play defense with George McLagan. In the summer he plays softball and is a yachting enthusiast.

**GEORGE McLAGAN** — George, who was born in Toronto, Ont., on Jan. 7, 1929, is starting his third season with the Islanders. For the past two years George has played a big part in the success of the local team and he appears to be headed for another good season. He started his hockey career with Stratford, Kroehlers and then moved to the Toronto Marlboros for two years in junior O. H. A. hockey. Following a year with Owen Sound in senior hockey he came to Charlottetown with Murph Chamberlain in 1950.

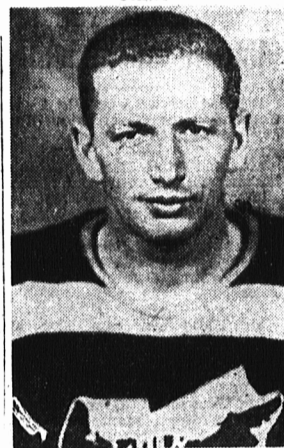
**ROY "BUCK" WHITLOCK** — Born in Charlottetown on Jan. 5, 1924, Buck possesses a long hockey pedigree. For the past five years he has played in Maritime senior and major hockey and has been the league's leading scorer in three of those years. Buck started playing with the Junior Royals in 1939. He served in the Navy throughout the war and is one of the survivors of the Frigate H. M. C. S. Valleyfield which was torpedoed in 1944. The year after the war he played with New Glasgow Bombers before moving on to the Moncton Hawks for three seasons. He then played two years with Saint John before coming back home to the Islanders last winter.

**JIM MacKENZIE** — Born in Winnipeg, Aug. 26, 1930. Height 5' 10". Weight 170 pounds. Jim, who was always centreman until last year when he was moved to left wing, started his hockey career with the Winnipeg Junior Canadiens. Following his time in junior hockey he moved to Shawinigan Falls where he played with the Cataracts for a year. Last year he came to the Islanders and despite a shoulder injury which sidelined him for six weeks, had an outstanding season. Jim also plays football and baseball.

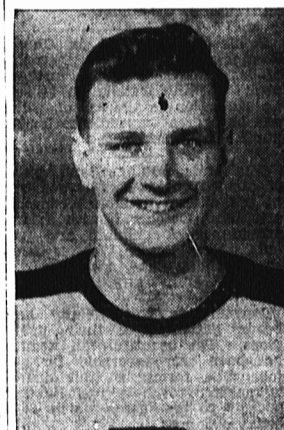
**CONNIE BONHOMME** — Born in North Bay, Ontario on Feb. 15, 1930. Height 5' 8". Weight 165 pounds. Connie played Junior hockey with Coppercliff Redmen for one season and with Toronto St. Mike's Juniors for two years. In 1950 he came to Glace Bay and that year was voted the All Star right winger in the Cape Breton League. Last year, following the Glace Bay-Charlottetown dispute he came to the Islanders. In addition to hockey he plays football, baseball and softball.

**RAY MARSHALL** — Born in Kirkland Lake, Ontario, June 7, 1929. Ray played his juvenile and junior hockey in Kirkland Lake with the Kirkland Lake Red Devils. Two years ago he played senior hockey with Timmins and last year he played with the Kirkland Lake senior team. Ray is 5' 10" in height and weighs 160 pounds. He also plays softball and baseball. 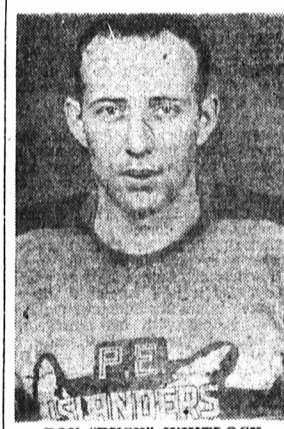

# Leafs, Canadiens Win Saturday Night Games

TORONTO, Oct. 19 —(CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs, clicking for three goals in less than two minutes of the third period, edged New York Rangers 4-3 Saturday night before 13,126 National Hockey League fans.

The victory, their first in four starts of the young season, lifted Leafs into a fourth-place tie with Boston Bruins. For the injury-riddled Rangers, it was their fourth straight setback, leaving them in the cellar.

Teeder Kennedy, Sid Smith, Max Bentley and Rudy Migay were the Leaf marksmen.

Herb Dickenson, Harry Howell — up from Quebec Biltmore Juniors to fill in for injured defenceman

Leo Reise — and Nick Mickoski tallied for the Rangers.

Lorne Worsley, recalled from Saskatoon Quakers of the Western Hockey League when goalie Chuck Rayner was hurt in a pre-season game, was a standout for New York.

The Leafs had a big margin in the shots-on-goal department, 42 to 20, and Worsley had a busy night. Time after time Leafs hustled in close on the rookie, fired shots at him from all angles and he practically "ate" the puck.
