

### AN EXAMPLE.

Mr. FIELDING supports Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte and the other ministers in the declaration that all the pledges and promises of the government have been fulfilled. We say that not one of them has been fulfilled according to expectation. It is true that we had a plebiscite on prohibition; but the result which the people were taught to expect from a majority vote in favor of prohibition has not been realized. In other cases the government has not made even the weakest attempt to implement their contracts with the people. Take for example the formal declaration of the Ottawa conference that, "we view with alarm the increase of controllable annual expenditure and the consequent increase of taxation since 1878." An moral obligation to reduce expenditures was there and then entered into by the Liberals. With what result? The controllable expenditure which was then \$36,814,025 continually increased until in the year closed on the 30th of June last it reached the sum of \$42,976,051,—just \$6,026,909 more than the amount which the Liberals in Convention at Ottawa viewed "with alarm." Mr. Fielding now pleads that unavoidable expenditures have occurred in the Yukon and elsewhere. Such unavoidable increased expenditures were constantly occurring while the Liberal-Conservatives were in office. But the Liberals in Convention were blind to all these—they were so greatly "alarmed" at the increased taxation and the increased debt! By the way, the increased expenditure and taxation under the Conservatives were as nothing to the increased expenditure and debt under Tarte-Laurier, Sifton-Blair and company.

### NOTES AND COMMENT.

—Sergeant Lindsay is not alone among the Canadians who won the Victoria Cross. That honorable distinction has also been won by Sergeant A. H. L. Richardson, of Strathcona's Horse. He rescued a wounded comrade while under a cross fire from the Boers.

Mr. Fielding said one true thing at the meeting on Friday evening. He said: "There is a national seed time which results in harvest." The seed time of Canada was the time in which the Liberal-Conservatives held office. Mr. Fielding and his followers are now reaping the fruits of Conservative labors and expenditures.

—A Lorenzo Marques dispatch reports that the French consul has been forbidden access to Mr. Kruger, as have also the latter's own officials. The district governor has notified Herr Pott, the Netherlands consul, that he (Pott), who had acted as the Boer consular agent at Lorenzo Marques, can no longer be recognized as a representative of the Transvaal, which is now British territory.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that the readiness of the United States Government to withdraw its troops from Pekin is hardly in keeping with the "open door" stand taken with such blowing of trumpets only a few months ago. For the international force to quit Pekin before the Chinese Government is ready to take it over again, just now looks like abandoning Northern China to Russia, and a permanent narrowing of the doorway by the width of the slice the Russian grabs.

### SHAWINIGAN FALLS, P. Q.

The Belgo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Corporation, of which Messrs. Edmund de Vyljer and Herman Cornet, of Brussels, Belgium, are the principal stockholders, have recently completed arrangements to establish at Shawinigan Falls, P. Q., a 100-ton ground wood pulp mill, a 75-ton pulp mill and a 100-ton paper mill, and have contracted with the Shawinigan Water and Power Company for 15,000 horse power of water and the necessary land for the storage of pulp and for their numerous mill buildings, and have also purchased over 700 square miles of heavily timbered spruce lands on the St. Maurice River, which will afford them an almost inexhaustible supply of pulp wood.

The pulp and Paper Company's Engineer, A. C. Rice, Esquire, at Worcester, Mass., has engaged to take the natural conditions as they are, furnish all plans and specifications, place all contracts for the development of power, the erection of buildings and the furnishing of such machinery and supplies as may be necessary to equip the mills to make the required product.

The building of the pulp mills will be commenced at once and the contracts call for the completion of the same not later than June 1st, 1900, while other mill buildings must be completed within two years from the present time. Nearly a thousand men will be required to perform this work within the specified time, in addition to which over 750 men will go into the woods this fall to secure a supply of pulp wood for these mills during the season of 1901.

The factory buildings of the Pittsburgh Reduction Company at Shawinigan Falls are now far advanced towards completion and will soon be ready to receive a large number of mill operatives. In addition to the Pittsburgh Reduction Company and the Belgo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Corporation it is highly probable that the third of the four large manufacturing concerns who have contracted for land for mill buildings and power to operate the same, will commence work at Shawinigan Falls this season. This satisfactory condition of affairs is certain to secure steady employment and good wages to all people in that part of the Province of Quebec.
