OTTAWA (Special)—Delegates will be returned with an even greater majority than they have enjoyed for the past decade. He paid tribute to the P.E.I. Liberal women's organization as an important factor both during and between election campaigns.

Neither CCF nor Social Credit policies have any appeal to the electorate of the Island Province, Mr. Rogers said. Citizens of P. E. I. believe in the two-party system and have given evidence repeatedly of that belief.

TORONTO, (CP)—Two closely-associated Maritimes mining companies formed by M. J. Boylen during the New Brunswick staking boom will receive millions of dollars, in backing through an agreement signed this week.

Bathurst Mining Corporation, Ltd. and Maritimes Mining Corporation Ltd. each get \$1,500,000 for use on as-yet-undisclosed developments.

Under the agreement Falconbridge Nickel Mines Ltd. will contribute one-third and New Brunswick Trust Company of Fredericton two-thirds by underwriting 750,000 shares of stock for each company at \$2 a share.

Another 1,500,000 shares from each company were optioned at the same price to provide \$3,000,000 for each.

Bathurst Mining holds 42 claims in Gloucester County 18 miles south of Bathurst, Maritimes holds 53 claims in the same district.

Both sides claims held by Brunswick Mining and Smelting Corporation.

WASHINGTON, (CP)—A Canadian army corporal was held for court action Wednesday after a coroner's jury found probable cause for a charge of negligent homicide in the Christmas Day traffic death of his four-year-old daughter.

Police testified Cpl. Raymond J. Moore, 27, of Ottawa and now stationed at Canadian military headquarters here, had been drinking before the street accident in which he, his wife and two other children were injured.

The daughter, Judy Lynn, died from concussion suffered in a car accident as the Moores were returning from a Christmas afternoon with friends.
