

Emmore Family Loses Second Home By Fire

MOUNT PLEASANT — An Emmore family has again lost its home in a fire. The residence of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Noye of Emmore, burned to the ground Saturday morning along with most of its contents.

It was the second time in 10 years that this family has lost its home by fire, and it is reported that earlier than this it had lost a third home to fire.

The Saturday morning fire was first observed by neighbours at the residence of Milford Noye, about a quarter of a mile distant, who noticed smoke pouring from the gable end of the two-storey residence, and phoned to tell the occupants that their house was on fire.

Mr. Noye, an employee of Curran and Briggs Ltd., was away from home at the time, and Mrs. Noye and son Allison were the only occupants of the house when the fire was discovered.

Neighbours from the district gathered quickly as the alarm spread, but were unable to do anything to save the building, and were able to remove only a few articles from the down stair section of the home.

After the loss of their home about 10 years ago, the residence destroyed on Saturday was moved to the same site, and

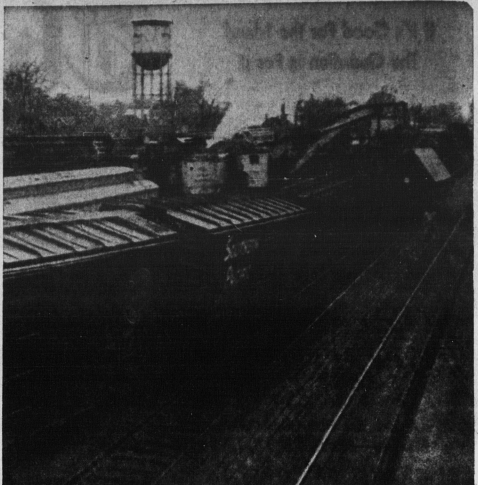

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government launched court action Saturday to halt any interference or intimidation of Negroes seeking to register as voters in Greenwood and Leflore counties, Mississippi. The suit specifically named officials of Greenwood and Leflore County, Mississippi, Attorney General Robert Kennedy and said they had used "intimidation, threats and coercion" including the "arrest and prosecution" of Negro registration workers.

Some Observers Feel Moon Shot Was Miss

MOSCOW (AP) — Lunik IV passed within 5,300 miles of the moon and yielded valuable information to Soviet scientists, Tass reported.

It was the widest miss of any of the four Russian moon shots and Lunik IV was reported doomed to become a satellite of the sun.

The Soviet news agency announced Saturday the instrument-crammed, 1,130-pound research vehicle—five times heavier than its 1959 model predecessors—passed the moon at 4:28 a.m. Moscow time (6:28 p.m. EST Friday) at a distance of 5,261 miles.

That compares with a 4,700-mile miss by the pioneering Lunik I, a hit with the landing of Lunik II, and an approach to within 4,375 miles by Lunik III on an orbital flight that yielded pictures of the perpetually hidden back side of the moon.

A suspicion among foreigners that Lunik IV did not do all Soviet scientists expected it to do was fed by the fact Tass spoke of its accomplishments only in general terms and wrote off the first in a 300-word communiqué.

SEES FAILURE
(The director of Britain's Jodrell Bank radio telescope, Sir Bernard Lovell, said he believed the Russians had failed through human error or faulty equipment — in a serious attempt to land instruments on the moon. Lovell commented: "If the Russians do not succeed in making soft landings of instruments in the next six months their time scale in the manned moon program will be broken.")

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — John B. Wilson, 54, a millionaire financier and sports car enthusiast, was stabbed to death with a Japanese sword Saturday and police charged his wife with murder.

Mrs. Wilson, 45, mother of three, was released on \$2,500 bond. Her lawyer, John J. Hooker, said: "They had been out to a party and came home about 2 a.m. and were in the son's bedroom. He was talking to the boy William Cochrane, Wilson's stepson) and she admonished her husband about disturbing the boy."

"She had the sword in her hand—not with any intent of doing any injury to him. He lunged toward her and into the sword."

Dr. W. J. Core, metropolitan medical examiner, said the 36-inch blade penetrated the victim's heart.
