Iran Turns Down Latest British Oil Offer

Polish Consul Quits Post, Decides Will Remain In Canada

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 (CP) — A recent purge of high army officials in Communist-dominated Poland tipped the scales for Zygmunt Ziemski, Polish Consul in Canada.

Latest of a wide group of diplomatic representatives from Poland and a number of other Russian-dominated countries to take the step, the 59-year-old Consul said he took the decision "after thinking of it for a long time."

When he came to Canada conditions were "entirely different from the present."

"At that time I hoped that the developments in Poland would be favorable to the Polish people in the long run. I lost my hope after the events of 1948 and 1949 showed that Poland was becoming completely dominated by the Communist Party and influenced by a foreign country so I had in my mind the idea of resigning."

"The last events in Poland, particularly the trial of Polish high officers, made me awfully depressed and forced me to take the final step."

"I have been very happy in Canada because of the feeling of real freedom and democratic life in high degree... I am grateful to stay here."

Britain To Look Elsewhere For Supplies

TEHRAN, Aug. 17 (CP) — Tehran radio tonight reported Britain's latest offer for settlement of the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute is "not acceptable" to the Iranian Government.

The broadcast apparently answered Richard Stokes' earlier statement that Iran must accept his plan for settling the dispute over the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company if it is to continue to supply Britain with oil.

Stokes, Britain's Lord Privy Seal and chief of a British Cabinet mission to reopen negotiations with Iran on the nationalization of the rich oil industry, proposed sale of the oil through a British-dominated agency. He described the plan as "the best offer I can make."

Forecasts Big Chemical Industry For Nova Scotia

HALIFAX, Aug. 17 (CP) — Discovery of a mineral deposit "with great industrial potentialities" was announced today by Industry Minister W.T. Dauphinee.

He said a large salt deposit had been found near a bed of high-quality limestone adjacent to Antigonish harbor.

"The condition," he said, "together with the coal readily available from either the Pictou County or Cape Breton fields, raises strong possibilities that Nova Scotia will shortly become an important producer of basic industrial chemicals."

He said exploration work is continuing but that drilling operations already have shown more than 200 feet of salt bedded over a wide area.

The salt was found at 779 feet. "We don't know yet where the lateral limits of the formation are," Mr. Dauphinee said, "but we do know we have millions of tons of salt and at least two million tons of limestone almost on top of it."

TOKYO, Aug. 16 (Saturday) (AP) — The Peiping radio said today the armistice sub-committee yesterday took the "first step" toward "finding a solution to the issue of deactivating the truce talks."

MUNSAN, Korea, Aug. 16 (Saturday) — (AP) — Prospects of a cease-fire in the Korean war brightened slightly today after the Communists intimated willingness to compromise on the critical buffer-zone issue.

Optimism was fed also by an atmosphere of friendliness between Allied and Red members of the four-man sub-committee in their first informal session Friday.

First Report Of 1951 Census Made Public; Urban Populations Up

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 (CP) — The industrial city of Hull, Que., across the Ottawa River from the capital showed the biggest population jump in the first report of Canada's 1951 census, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The initial report of the June census covered 326 cities, towns and incorporated villages—none of them large but representing every Province. A full report is expected next December.

In the 10-year period covered by the census, Hull's population jumped more than 10,000 to 43,204 from 32,947.

Wheat Report

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 (CP) — Canada had a wheat carry-over of 184,780,000 bushels on July 31, a jump of 70,000,000 bushels from 113,200,000 last year, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The total wheat carry-over was held in United States points, making a total of 186,432,000. The carry-over includes 22,259,000 bushels held on farms, compared with the estimated 12,400,000 on July 31, 1950.

OTTAWA, Aug. 17 (CP) — Trade and government officials estimated today that housewives will pay roughly 70 cents a pound for butter next winter as a result of government action to stabilize the market.

Forty Trees Affected

Mr. Robert Snazelle, in charge of the Provincial Nursery at Southport, said yesterday that upwards of 40 trees were being removed and there was a possibility of more having to be taken out. If this has to be done it will not be until after the Royal visit in November. Meantime the lawns where the trees have been uprooted will be reseeded. Eventually the entire action will be landscaped. It is possible that some evergreens will also be added on the Government Pond side of Government House.
