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# 64 Hog Pictorial Shows Quantity Up, Price Low

Plenty of good pork for the consumer and somewhat lower prices for the producer sum up the hog outlook in Canada for the coming year.

According to Canada Department of Agriculture economists, as reported in the department's August news letter, hog marketing will remain above last year's levels, particularly during the third quarter of 1964.

The economists estimate that marketings in Canada will total 1,650,000 in the last 12 months of this year. The figure is an average of 130,000 per week and 11 per cent more than last year.

Marketings are expected to rise to close to 140,000 head in September. The July average was about 120,000 head per week.

**PRICE DROP**  
The department of agriculture expects that prices at Toronto will probably drop from present levels of \$28 per hundredweight to around \$26 per hundredweight in September. In Calgary, prices may drop to about \$24 per hundredweight, compared to present levels of \$25.50.

According to Dominion Bureau of Statistics estimates, as of September 1 there were 5,600,000 hogs on farms in Canada. This is an eight per cent increase over 1963.

In Eastern Canada, hog numbers increased two per cent to 2,500,000 head, despite small drops in Quebec and New Brunswick. The West showed an overall increase of 18 per cent, divided fairly equally among the three provinces.

Market experts call for a four per cent increase in hog marketings during the last quarter of this year, over the last quarter of 1963. It is expected that 1,850,000 hogs will be marketed during October, November and December, or 142,500 hogs per week.

**EXPORTS HEAVY**  
Hog exports continue to be heavy with 65,000,000 pounds expected to be exported in 1964, as compared to 54,000,000 pounds in 1963.

Next year's forecast for the first quarter calls for 3,800,000 hogs to be marketed—a five per cent increase over this year's levels. Eastern producers are expected to supply 2,315,000 hogs, slightly above last year's production.

Supplies of pork are expected to be better than last year's, so prices will probably average about one dollar per hundredweight below 1964 levels.

**Magistrate Issues Warning On Violations By Small Boats**

Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, issued a stern warning to all fishermen yesterday, when he presided in the Queens County magistrate's court over the case of Joseph Edward Blaisiere, of North Rustico, who pleaded guilty to the charge of failing to provide an adequate number of small lifebelts, one for each passenger, in his boat.

The case, which came under the Shipping Act regulations, was one of the first of its kind prosecuted here, though the Attorney General's office has issued orders to the RCMP to crack down on offenders. In issuing the fine of \$20 and costs on 10 days, the magistrate warned that all such cases in the future would be much more severely dealt with.

Apparently fishermen in the Rustico area did not know that the regulations apply to all craft, and not just to those which hire for passengers.

Blaisiere was also fined \$50 and costs of 15 days when he pleaded guilty to another charge of operating a vessel while his ability to do so was impaired.

A total of four cases of impaired driving were on the docket, one of which was withdrawn.

Robert Gessner Sillphart of Hunter River, who had previously entered a plea of not guilty, was remanded by consent to Friday, Aug. 14 for trial.

**Playground Attendance Still Climbing**

Attendance was up by more than a thousand youngsters over the previous week in the city's controlled playgrounds this past week, according to city athletic director James Fox.

Totals for the week broke down this way: Hillsboro Square 714; Connaught Square 696; Victoria Park, 2,283; Kinsman Park 970; and Spring Park 679. That means a grand sum of 3,360 children availed themselves of the facilities in playgrounds offered by the city.

Figures for the first full month of operation indicate that during July 29,023 youngsters turned out for the daily sessions. Special events for the week included a horse show tournament, a kiddies' concert and two picnics, in which the various playgrounds were involved.

**Cows Qualify In Performance Test Records**

A number of Prince Edward Island Ayshire cows have qualified in record of performance tests with good production figures, it is indicated in the current issue of the Canadian Ayshires Review.

Mount Pearl Nectar was third in her class, senior 3-year old, for the month under review with 12,201 milk, 594 fat for 100 lbs. of milk and 14.1 per cent milk and fat. She is owned by the Experimental Farm at Charlottetown.

Cloverview Snowball, owned by W. A. Mason and son, Kensington produced 11,224 pounds of milk, 462 fat for 100 lbs. of milk, 14.2 in the same class.

The Moose herd's Cloverview Christie produced 8,350 milk, 361 fat for 100 lbs. of milk, 129 fat as a junior 2-year old.

Fairvue Duchess Dianne produced 10,826 milk, 449 fat for A. MacRae and son, Sherwood, 21 a mature cow, for BCAs of 128 milk, 131 fat.
