A PROGRESSIVE CITY.—The Toronto assessors have completed their labors, and the total assessment amounts to \$113,183,828, as compared with \$98,297,907 for last year, showing an increase of 14,885,921. The population of the city according to the assessors is 138,150, an increase of 11,931 during the year.

FROM THE LUMBER REGIONS.—Lumber operations during the coming winter on the upper Ottawa promise to be the most extensive for several years. Reports from Mattawa state already 7,000 shanty men have passed through that place on their way to upper Ottawa lumber districts.

AFTER THE COMPANY.—The Hamilton, Ont. Powder Company has taken action for \$10,000, against the Guarantee Company of North America for a policy of insurance upon their cashier, Samuel Johnson, who committed suicide. Shortly after Johnson's death it transpired that he was a defaulter to the extent of about \$5,000.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Fredericton Races.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 4. Despite a cold wind over 1,000 persons patronized the races this afternoon. The grand stand was completely filled, the per centage of ladies being unusually large. There was fine sport. All the events with one exception being keenly contested. The first event was the stake race for foals of 1886, mile heats, best two in three. The starters were Belmont, by Haferman of Fredericton, Neryia, of St. John, Prince Charles, of Woodstock, and Sagitta of Sussex. Neryia distanced the field in the first heat—time, 3:04. In the three minute class, for \$125, mile heats, best three in five, Sussex Lass took first place, Blackbird second and Disappointment third. Best time 2:34. In the race for foals of 1884, mile heats, three in five, Lady Max, St. John, first, in three straight heats. Wildflower, of Charlottetown, failed to get a place. To-morrow's races excite great interest, and there is considerable betting to-night on the different contests. The track is in splendid order and very fast time is expected.

Sad Death of Mrs. Selig.

HALIFAX, Oct. 4. The evidence taken on the request of the S. P. C. A. at the coroner's inquest, concerning the death of Mrs. Selig, shows that an investigation was necessary. The doctor was sent for to pull her teeth. He gave her ether, and her husband held her hands. After a number of teeth were extracted, she revived and begged them to let her go. Her husband let go her hands, but Dr. Andrews said, "Damn you, hold on," and some more teeth were extracted. Afterwards the doctor gave her something to ease the pain, when she dragged herself to her bedroom moaning piteously. She became unconscious in a short time and died. Dr. Jacques performed a post mortem. Other evidence will be offered.

Montreal Miscellany.

MONTREAL, Oct. 4. Bishop Moreau, of St. Hyacinthe, left to-night for Rome, to attend the opening of the Canadian Seminary there. Abbe Culin leaves to-morrow. The S.S. Parisian was got afloat and has arrived in port. Her hull is uninjured. She was delayed altogether about sixteen hours, and the passengers, who did not disembark at Quebec, remained on board all the time. Leon Dupris is found hanging in a stable in the rear of his house, at La Prairie, last night. He went home drunk last night when his wife turned him out of doors. The French Board of Trade have passed a resolution requesting wholesale merchants to refuse a discharge to any man burnt out, whose stock was not insured to the amount of at least 60 per cent.

The Whitechapel Murders.

LONDON, Oct. 4. The British Medical Journal, referring to the Whitechapel murders, says: "The coronor's theory that the assassin's work was carried on under impulse of pseudo-scientific mania, has been exploded by a first attempt at serious investigation. It is true that a foreign physician inquired, a year or two ago, as to the possibility of securing parts of the body for the purpose of scientific investigation, but no large sum was offered, and the physician in question is of the highest respectability and exceedingly well accredited."

Killing a Bear.

KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 4. A black bear, weighing 400 pounds, was killed near here this morning. Geo. Babcock came near losing his life in the encounter. The bear buried his teeth in his thigh, lacerating the flesh badly. A dog, when it saw Babcock down, fiercely attacked the bear and saved Babcock's life.

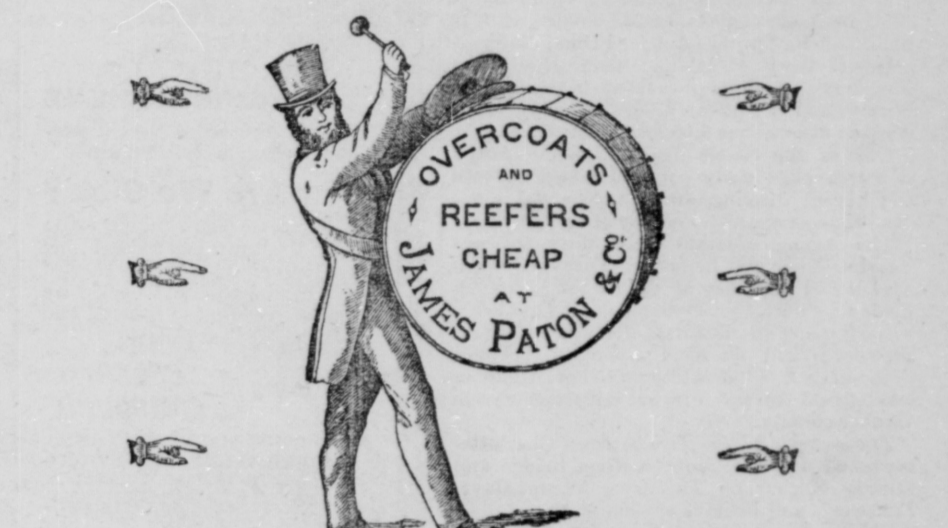
