IN MEMORIAM DUNCAN LIVINGSTON

There passed to his eternal reward at his home, 48 Kent St., City, in the early hours of May 26th, Duncan Livingston, at the advanced age of 86 years.

The late Mr. Livingston was born at Nine Mile Creek, P. E. I., the son of the late Captain Archibald and Sophia (Ladue) Livingstone.

He moved at an early age to this city where he entered the employ of Mark Butcher and Co. as cabinet maker and continued in this skilled work with the firm and their successors, Mark Wright and Co. for many years. Later he became sexton of the Kirk of St. James, of which he was a life-long adherent, and in this capacity made many firm and enduring friends by his pleasing and obliging manner.

Prior to his retirement he was for some years the genial steward of the Charlottetown Club where he was held in the highest esteem by all members.

During his entire life his honesty and integrity combined with a pleasant and kindly manner, made him popular and respected by young and old alike.

He was the last surviving member of his family, his only brother, John A. Brockton, Mass., and sister, Phebe, Mrs. J. Donaghue, Cambridge, Mass., having predeceased him. He was also predeceased by his wife, Lucretia (Larter) eleven years ago, and the following children: Jane, (Mrs. Arthur White), Cambridge, Mass.; Minnie (Mrs. Alvin Anderson), Cambridge, Mass.; Gordon, who was killed overseas in 1917; Pheobe (Mrs. Jefferson Rhoades), Atlantic City, N. J.; and Sophia, (Mrs. James A. MacEachern), City, the two latter passing away in November and January respectively.

Manslaughter Charge Dismissed

The charge of manslaughter against John Harris Notting, Charlottetown, was dismissed at the preliminary hearing yesterday before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in the Queen's County Magistrate's Court. The Magistrate stated there was no evidence of criminal negligence to warrant accused being committed to Supreme Court, on a charge either of manslaughter or reckless driving.

The hearing, which was opened on July 30th, arose as a result of the death of Robert Clark Bryenton, following a car accident on July 5th, near Fairview. The deceased was in company with Notting, who was driving.

Cpl. Allan Johnstone, of the R. C. M. P., in his evidence, submitted photographs of the scene of the accident, and was followed by Cons. Thurston, who gave details of the investigation, including measurements at the scene of the accident. From where the car began to slew in the road until it came to rest in a field, after breaking down posts and a fence, was a distance of 300 feet.

Cpl. Pinnock testified that he found 4 full beer bottles and the remnants of 16 with crowns presumably smashed, and some glass possibly due to other breakage.

Allison MacMillan testified that the road had been improved 3 or 4 years ago and widened. As a winter road it had been considerably damaged at this curve by snow machines carrying off part of the shoulder and leaving an improper grade there. It was considered dangerous by himself and others in the vicinity.

John Notting testified on his own behalf that he was on his way to Holland Cove in company with Bryenton, intending to return to the city to attend the races. He had been over the road once before, but had not been driving the car at that time. The occasion of the accident was the first time he had driven a car over it, and he was not familiar with it. He testified that he had not been drinking either during the afternoon or evening.

He had purchased the car in Nova Scotia about two weeks previously and had made minor repairs himself, and believed it to be in good working order. He was driving at 40 or 45 miles per hour and did not realize that he was approaching a turn. There were no signs to this effect. He felt a pull to the right and almost instantly went into the ditch, becoming unconscious. He had only a vague impression of what happened afterwards.

Mr. John P. Nicholson appeared for the crown and David L. Mathieson, Q. C., for the accused.
