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TORONTO

TORONTO (CP) — The stock market was mixed to higher Tuesday in fairly active trading.

Base metals were the leaders ahead almost one-half point while golds were up nearly one-third. Western oils remained down for the third session as profit-taking continued to cut into gains recorded early last week.

Five speculative mines accounted for slightly more than one quarter of the volume. Vale was the most active issue, up 1 cent at 14 cents of 430,000 shares.

New Hosco turned over 327,073 shares, adding 40 cents at \$3.35. Senior miners strengthened near the close to lead base metals. Besides International Nickel other winners included Steep Rock, ahead 3/4 and 1/2 gains by Falconbridge and Consolidated Mining.

Golds were strong with McIntyre the leader up 2 1/2 at 79. Senior issues were fractional losers among western oils.

TROOPS TOO REALISTIC

HANOVER, Germany AP — The West German state of Lower Saxony Monday demanded that British and Canadian troops halt their manoeuvres on the Lunenburg Heath because of excessive damage to crops and property. A state government spokesman said the nature of the damage indicates to some observers that it was done with malice.

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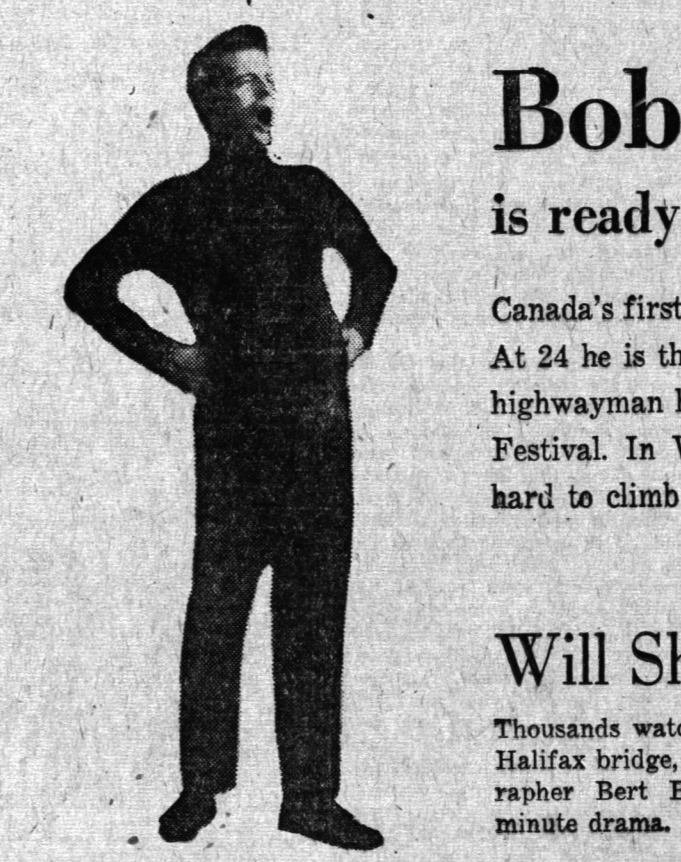

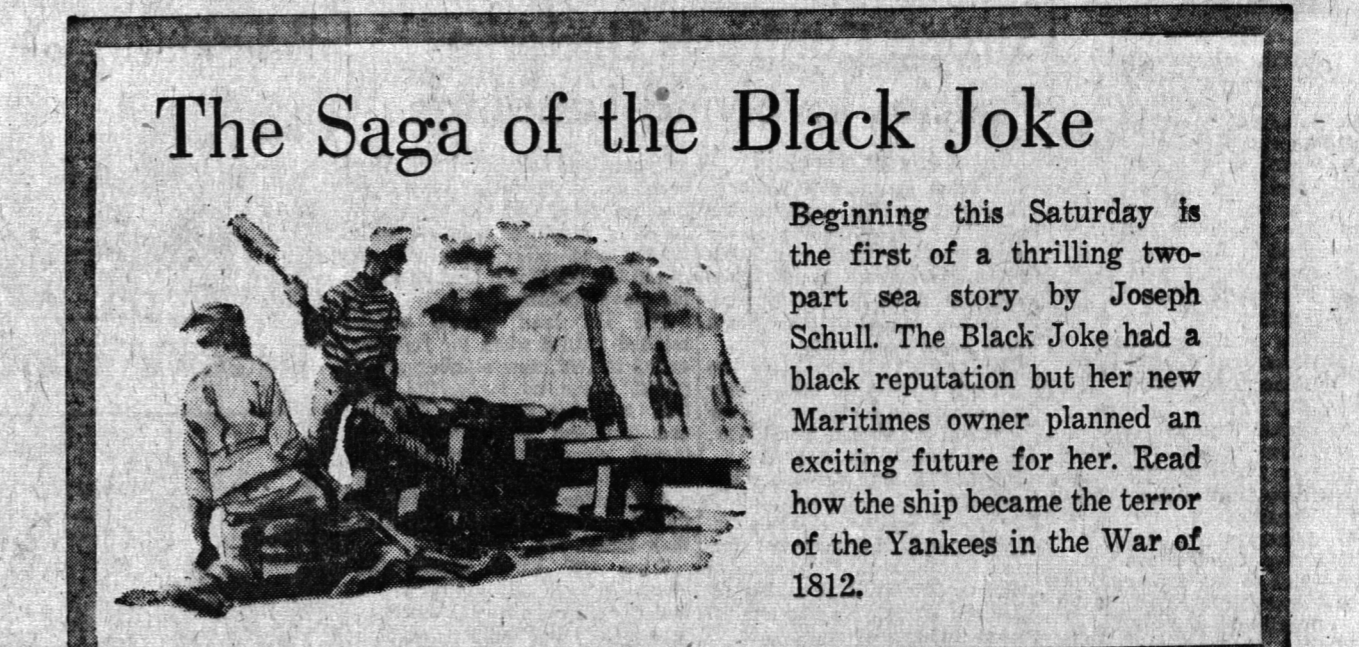


Bob Goulet is ready for Broadway

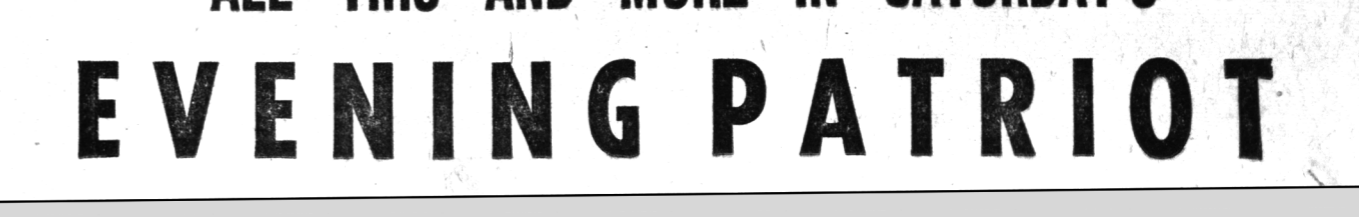
