Sea Cadet Corps Kent Praised On Inspection

 Cmdr. E.T. Jeffrey, CD, RCN, had high praise for the appearance and bearing of the cadets of the local Sea Cadet Corps, RCNCS Kent, particularly the band, following his inspection at HMCS Queen Charlotte 1 at 8 p.m.

He told the cadets that following his taking over as commanding officer and coming into contact with the Sea Cadet movement at the summer camp last year, he was very impressed with the type of boys who belonged to the movement and by their general conduct and bearing.

Cmdr. Jeffrey, who is now on retirement leave following some 25 years service, 20 years with the Royal Navy and 15 with the Royal Canadian Navy, has now turned his hand to farming at Prince Edward Island, and plans to go into the beef cattle business.

He said that it was affection for the sea cadet movement that prompted him to request the opportunity to inspect the three Island corps, soon after taking up residence at Flat River. He has also purchased a farm in the same district.

"Speaking of the band," Cmdr. Jeffrey said that in his travels across Canada he had seen and heard many huge bands, but he doubted if very many of them could come up to the standard of precision drill and music that he had witnessed in the Kent band.

He also had praise for the precision manner in which officers and instructors gave their orders, and by the prompt and efficient manner in which the cadets carried them out.

"In general, Kent Corps in all phases of its training and ceremonial work presented a very smart appearance, and its standard of efficiency is high," he said.

EDUCATION STRESSED
 Cmdr. Jeffrey, in his address to the cadets, placed strong emphasis on education, and urged the cadets to pursue their schooling and get as much as possible. "Education is not only essential to get through civilian life," he said, "it is also one of the biggest assets a man can have if he should decide to make the navy a career."

He reminded the cadets that they were very fortunate in that they had such fine facilities for

carrying out their training, by having such a modern naval establishment at their disposal. In their daily duties in or out of school, he impressed upon the cadets that it was one of their duties to talk to and encourage other boys, who possess the required education and age standards to enrol in the sea cadets.

 He also reminded the cadets that they were the wearers of the Queen's uniform, and that they should stand up and wear it with pride.

He thanked the many citizens who turned out to witness the inspection, particularly the many parents. "The presence of so many parents and other interested persons on such an occasion, is very encouraging to the cadets," he said.

For himself he informed the cadets and guests, that although he had retired from the navy, he had every intention of maintaining his contact with the cadets' movement as one of the chief phases.

Number Of Blind In P.E.I. Declines

The number of blind persons registered in Prince Edward Island is the lowest figure since the inception of the advisory board of the Institute for the Blind in 1949.

At the 14th annual meeting of the board held Tuesday night at the CNIB centre on Gratton St., delegates were told that as of March 31, the number of registrants in the province was 147, three less than a year ago and the lowest figure in the history of the board.

It was also disclosed in a more detailed report that the eye bank thereby brought in a total of 23. One of the members of the institute may now be able to have improved vision if an eye transplant is successful.

Work was also done in the field of blindness prevention. In P.E.I. 209 persons received eye service, the most extensive program being the organization of Glaucoma Screening Clinics by the Lions Clubs in the province to detect and cure this sight-threatening disease.

Hospital Employees Await Commission's Wage Decision

Some 140 non-professional employees of both city hospitals are still awaiting the Hospital Services Commission's decision regarding the two union locals' demands for a seven per cent increase in wages.

The commission is currently conducting an investigation to determine the cost of raising the wage scale of workers in all island hospitals to meet the sea cadets.

Hospital employees, such as ward clerks, unlicensed orderlies, and members of the house-keeping, dietary, and maintenance staffs, are salaried by the hospital services commission, although hired and employed by the hospitals.

Negotiations for the salary increases have been carried out for the past two years. Hospital administrators and workers have agreed on the settlement, but the raise itself must come through the commission.

If no wage increase is forthcoming, a strike vote will be taken to determine the individual wishes of the union members. A 60 per cent favorable vote is necessary before a strike can be called.

C. R. McQuaid, secretary of the labor relations board, said that should a strike be called, the hospitals would not be completely crippled. He said that there is a provision that employees are not permitted to strike. A strike would hamper the operation of the hospitals to a certain extent, but they would not have to close down.

P.E.I. and Nova Scotia service is listed for an extra \$3,988 and the P.E.I. and Newfoundland service for an additional \$20,000. This brings total estimated spending under the transport department to \$52,928.

NATIONAL PARK
 Prince Edward Island's National Park is listed for \$197,702 for a 4000 acre site. Operation and maintenance, plus a supplementary amount of \$2,000. For construction and acquisition of buildings, woods, land and equipment the P.E.I. park will receive \$350,350 for a total of \$547,052.

In the field of health and welfare, the Island will receive \$217,284 in hospital construction grants, \$329,249 in other health grants, plus a supplementary amount of \$100,000 for a grand total of \$646,533.

In the justice department, the vote for P.E.I. for judge's salaries and allowances comes to \$101,700.

A supplementary agricultural vote provides \$80,000 which is one half the amount paid by the province to compensate farmers for the loss of 1962 grain crops which they were unable to harvest because of weather conditions.

In the field of defence, \$650,000 is earmarked for completion of the largest construction project in the province to amount for \$150,000 for the purchase of a new minesweeper. A bulk fuel compound at the same location is listed in spending items at \$100,000.
