THE INTERCOLONIAL Railway receipts for the month of July were \$165,603, against \$146,713 for the month last year. The increase for the month is therefore \$18,890, or about 11 per cent. The increase for the seven months of this year has been \$106,230. Every month in the year shows an increase over the corresponding month last year, notwithstanding the immense increase last year over 1879. Is it ruin or prosperity?—Times.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. P. E. Island Railway.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND. LONDON, Aug. 15.

Earl Pembroke writes to the Times protesting against the cry being raised that the amendments of the Lords to the Land Bill are an attack on the principle of the Bill. He says that it is not true in regard to one single amendment, except that dealing with the termination of existing leases, and that amendment only reverts the Bill to the shape in which it entered the House of Commons. The obstinate injustice of the Government towards the landlords, he says, is the sole cause of the dead lock.

The Times says the temperate judgment of rational men is unanimous that the differences between the two houses ought to be composed; nor is there the slightest reason to believe that a fair, moderate and practicable arrangement is out of the question.

The Daily News says if Gladstone resigns he would make the peers our masters. If the vote of a majority of the hereditary legislators could at any moment overbear the decision of the country, Parliamentary government would become a farce. The same may be said of the dissolution of Parliament and a general election.

The News discredits the idea of a conference between the two Houses.

In the Commons, this evening, Mr. Gladstone, replying to Mr. Parnell, said there would be no preliminary statements with respect to the land bill, but that the House would proceed to consider the amendments of the Lords forthwith.

Mr. Healy (Home Ruler) said he saw the germs of surrender in Gladstone's statement.

Mr. Gladstone was loudly cheered on his arrival at the House this afternoon, by a large crowd assembled at the entrance. The galleries of the House were crowded. Large numbers were present. Various petitions were presented, amid cheers from the Liberal side, against the House yielding to the amendments of the Lords impairing protection afforded to tenants by the Land Bill.

In the House of Commons this evening Gladstone said he did not wish to have the word "compromise" applied to proceedings of the Government. The House, he said, had trusted the Government so far, and he hoped it would continue to merit the trust. The House thereupon agreed to proceed with the consideration of amendments to the land bill, and, on motion of Mr. Gladstone, the last amendment of the Lords—excluding from the right of free sale tenancies on which permanent improvements have been made by landlords—was disagreed to.

A meeting of the committee of Federation of the Liberal Association to-day in reference to the action of the Lords on the Land Bill were numerous attended. Resolutions passed declaring that the Lords had mutilated the Land Bill in the interest of land owners, and to render it wholly unacceptable, and urging the Government to adhere firmly to the bill as it finally left the Commons and resist the dictation of a class majority in the House of Lords; it was also resolved that the action of the Lords raises a constitutional question tending directly to compel the country to consider the possibility of maintaining a system which will enable an irresponsible chamber to defeat the will of the nation.

The last amendment of the Lords, stricken out of the provision for staying proceedings for debt, was to night adopted in the Commons. A committee was then appointed to draw up reasons for the action of the House.

LONDON, Aug. 15.

Sir Charles Dilke being pressed in the Commons to answer a question as to whether or not the Government would advise the Khedive of Egypt to disband his army, said the gravity of the circumstances lying behind the question prevented his being explicit.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15. Secretary Lincoln, who is here, says he will not be able to do a great deal at Yorktown on account of the small appropriation, but will have 1,200 troops there, and will do all in his power for visiting volunteer soldiers. He believes President Garfield will recover, and if he did not think so he would not be absent from Washington.

Thomas Pettitte, of Boston, won the championship in the International Court Tennis match with Henry Boaker, of Quebec, champion of Canada.
