Charlottetown Hospital Opens New Pediatric Department This Week

With the opening of the new Pediatric Department at the Charlottetown Hospital this week, the last unit in the building construction program which has gone on for the past five years reached its final stage, and what for almost a generation has been only a dream now becoming a reality with every unit in the hospital functioning.

The Pediatric Department, designed for the care of children 12 years of age and under, offers complete medical and surgical facilities in a single self-contained unit. It is the first of its kind in the Province, and this built-in children's hospital within the hospital offers complete segregation in private semi-private rooms, separate cubicles for infants under 1 year of age and for those older.

Accommodating 32 patients, this new department offers to the public of Prince Edward Island everything that can be provided for the care of children. Completely air-conditioned throughout, all the units are individually styled and decorated in pastel shades, with wall designs and draperies designed to catch the eye and catch the imagination of all youngsters. With an accent on play therapy, everything has been done to distract the young mind from his illness.

Another first in this province is the ultra-violet irradiation unit in each room. These free the air of any bacteria present and prevent cross infection and contamination of air borne disease. All suspect cases will be admitted to the special isolation department where still extra precautions and preventive care can be given.

The Pediatric Department will be under the care of Miss Eileen MacDonald, R.N., whose special training in pediatric care was taken at the Ottawa Civic Hospital. Miss MacDonald is well known throughout the province to both children and their parents, and both Miss MacDonald and hospital authorities are receiving congratulations on this latest accomplishment.

Sister Mary of Good Counsel, Administrator of the Hospital, paid special tribute to the late Mother M. Paula under whose guidance the building program was begun.

Opening Ceremonies Sunday For Bishop's Hospital Fund

The opening ceremonies for the \$300,000 Bishop's Hospital Building Fund will be held Sunday afternoon in St. Dunstan's Basilica at 3:15. All campaign committee workers and Catholic families of the Diocese of Charlottetown are invited to attend this program which will herald the beginning of solicitation in the parish phase of the drive to raise the funds needed to help pay for the recently completed modernization and construction program at the Charlottetown Hospital.

His Excellency, the Most Reverend James Boyle, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown will be the principal speaker at tomorrow afternoon's meeting. The program also will include an address by Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, O.B.E., general chairman of the campaign. Bishop Boyle's address will be broadcast over radio station CFCY at 3:15, EST, for the benefit of those who are unable to be present at the Basilica.

Upon conclusion of Bishop Boyle's broadcast, the more than 2,200 volunteer committee members in the diocese-wide campaign will begin the calls on the fellow-parishioners who have been assigned for their special attention. All Catholic families have been asked to remain in their homes following the campaign opening ceremonies to receive the visit of the campaign worker.

Tomorrow's meeting will bring to a close the preparatory phase of the building fund campaign and will signal the solicitation of the more than 10,000 Catholic heads of families and wage earners of the Island.

Inspected Premier's Herd

Later in the day the party were taken to the farm of Premier J. Walter Jones at Bunbury. There they were shown the Premier's famous Holstein herd including Abegweit Milady, now coming 12 years of age and winner of two consecutive world's records. The visitors were keenly interested in everything shown at the farm, and expressed themselves as amazed at the performance of this famous cow.

Bus Jones also conducted the officials through his milk ranch, where more than 400 young animals in various stages of maturation are being raised. This was cited as an entirely new experience, and deeply interesting to the visitors.

The party were fortunate in having Mr. Berrie Cotter, widely known herdsman of Sussex, present during their visit, who drew upon his fund of knowledge to explain the finer points of purebred Holsteins in general and the Premier's herd in particular.

The visitors, who will continue their survey of Island farms today, are scheduled to leave at noon Sunday by air for Moncton, en-route to Kingston, Ont., where they will begin the second leg of their Canada wide tour, ending at Vancouver.
