South Shore Festival Executive Meets

The South Shore Musical Festival executive, additional executive, and conveners of Festival committees met in North Tryon School on Friday evening, August 29th. Representatives from the Women's Institutes of Victoria, Craipaid, Lady Fane, Tryon, North Tryon, Searletown, Albany Rural, Albany Village, Middleton, Bedouque, Central Bedouque and North Bedouque attended the meeting, twenty-nine in all.
The president, Mrs. Arthur MacKay, called the meeting to order. In the absence of the secretary, Mrs. Keith Boswell, Mrs. Donald Hart acted as secretary. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the treasurer's report read and accepted.
Mrs. W. A. Jones then proposed the following motion, which was seconded by Miss Johnstone, "that we invite, Kensington, Summerside, Slemon Park School, Notre Dame Convent, and any other schools of more than a certain registration, to hold a competition in connection with the South Shore Musical Festival, on the Friday preceding our Festival, and that on Saturday night we have a joint session, opening our adult classes to any one. If, because the suggestion comes so late, these schools feel that they cannot organize this year, I would amend my motion thus, that we add an extra session to our Festival, starting it on Friday evening, and omitting our individual adult classes on Saturday evening, offer some classes to the before mentioned schools, using a syllabus from a previous year in part." Mrs. Jones stated that last year the number of entries had been far too many for one day's programme, and that if they wished to have classes for the larger schools which had expressed a wish to be included they would not only need preliminary competitions, but an extra session as well.
A great deal of discussion took place regarding the above motion, after which the president asked for a standing vote. The motion was carried unanimously.
A discussion followed re adjudicators. Mr. Jones was instructed to contact the Charlottetown adjudicators. Miss Callbeck was asked to interview Mr. Leard re obtaining an adjudicator from the Choral Union University for the Choral Reading classes.
The matter of prizes was then brought before the meeting. It was moved by Miss Louise Callbeck and seconded by Mrs. Raymond Wood that individual prizes be discontinued this year, with the exception of annual trophies.
It was moved by Mrs. John Simons, seconded by Mrs. John Craig, that the Festival be held the 7th and 8th days of November this year, motion carried.
It was also decided that all entries must be in by the 22nd of October this year, without fail.
Mrs. Jones requested Mrs. George MacKay to meet with Mr. Jones to pick out the classes for the larger schools from the syllabus of two or three years previously.
The president, Mrs. MacKay, shocked the group by tending her resignation and requesting Mrs. Walter Craig, the vice-president, to take over her duties. It was moved by Mrs. Jones and seconded by Mrs. Boswell that her resignation not be accepted. A standing vote was called for, and the motion was passed unanimously.
It was suggested that another meeting be held the latter part of September. On motion the meeting adjourned.

Battle of Britain Sunday Observed In Summerside

Battle of Britain Sunday was fittingly observed at Summerside yesterday with church services, the laying of a wreath at the Cenotaph in Memorial Square, a fly past of three R.C.A.F. aircraft, and a parade composed of three squadrons from the R.C.A.F. station, Summerside.
Heroic men who helped in the final Battle of Britain, and young men and women, whom these veterans are training to carry on their noble work in defense of our country, attended services of worship in Summerside at 2.30 P.M. Services at St. Paul's Church were conducted by Wing Commander (Rev.) Wilfred Dunphy, senior Catholic chaplain from Trenton, Ontario, and at the Baptist Church by Flight Lieut. Condon, Protestant padre, R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside. Both services were attended by large groups of men and women in Air Force blue, as well as by civilians.
Following the service both groups united in a parade which led to Memorial Park where a large number of R.C.A.F. and civilians attended a short service honoring the memory of those brave men who fought and died in the skies over Britain in 1940. This service included a prayer for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the singing of the hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past", a memorial address by Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, commanding officer, R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside, the laying of wreaths by Group Captain Kenyon and by Mr. Roy Johnston on behalf of the R.C.A.F. Wing Association.
As the conclusion of the program, a fly past by three aircraft from the station added a striking touch to the service honoring the men who flew against such terrible odds and unhesitatingly placed their lives on the altar of freedom.
Following the service in Memorial Square, the parade, led by a color party, marched past the cenotaph stand on Central Street, in front of the new post office building where the salute was taken by Group Captain Kenyon. S.
