

UNCLE TOM'S CABIN MOVED

DRESDEN, Ont. (CP)—Uncle Tom's Cabin, home of the man who inspired the literary character who aroused American in support of emancipation of Negroes, has been moved for the third time to the site where local historians believe it originally stood.

The gray, two-storey frame home of the Rev. Josiah Henson, Uncle Tom in Harriet Beecher Stowe's novel Uncle Tom's Cabin, was transferred a half mile to a knoll overlooking the Negro preacher's grave, about 12 miles north of Chatham.

Mover Andy Jenkinson, who pronounced the building "as sound as a dollar," recalled helping his father move it in 1947 to get it away from nearby houses so as not to detract from its appearance.

Jack Thomson, tourist manager of the home and grave, said the present move probably restored the building to its original position, judging from records which indicate it stood as a knoll.

Josiah Henson, an escaped slave, came to the Dresden area in 1830 and for the more than 30 years helped escaped slaves who had made their way into Canada. He died at 84 in 1852.

CBC Makes Move To Expand French Atlantic Outlets

OTTAWA (CP) — The CBC has an idea to extend its French-language radio service to two more points in the Atlantic provinces.

Applications were made to the Board of Broadcast Governors to establish low-power radio relay transmitters at Rogersville, N.B., and Quinlan, N.S., which would carry programs of the French network.

Other applications were submitted for new shortwave relay transmitters to extend English-language service to Canton and Larry's River, N.S., and Wodey Point and Gowertown, Nfld.

R. C. Fraser, CBC vice-president for corporate affairs, submitted a CBC application to establish a new TV station at Deer Lake, Nfld. The new \$84,800 station would carry network programs and regional broadcasts from Corner Brook and in effect would fill a hole in the CBC's service provided by the CBC's Corner Brook station.

The BBG will announce its recommendations later.

Roulette Game Proves Fatal

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Thomas Carter, 18-year-old son of Pulitzer Prize-winning editor Hodding Carter, killed himself playing Russian roulette at his father's New Orleans residence.

The only witness to the fatal shooting was Alice Monroe, 20, member of a socially prominent New Orleans family.

Sam Moran, investigator at the coroner's office, said Miss Monroe told him that she went with young Carter to his father's residence shortly before 10 p.m.

Miss Monroe told Moran Carter pulled a revolver from beneath a sofa, removed five cartridges from the gun's cylinder — leaving the sixth cartridge in the cylinder — and told her he was going to play Russian roulette.

She told Moran that young Carter put the gun to his head and pulled the trigger. The gun fired and he slumped forward.

TO EXCHANGE CONSULS

KUALA LUMPUR (AP) — The Malaysian Federation and the Philippines will proclaim an exchange of consulates in a week, a Malaysian foreign ministry spokesman said Monday. The Malaysian government severed diplomatic relations last September with the Philippines, which has a claim on Sabah (formerly North Borneo) and refused to recognize the new British-backed federation.
